

were promptly removed to this place, where medical aid was given them. The men that were burned presented a horrible sight, being literally charred. The coroner began an inquest to-day.

The British cabinet is discussing Mr. Gladstone's bill for Irish home rule. Absolute secrecy regarding its provisions is maintained.

A meteor fourteen inches in circumference fell in the street in Albany, Oregon. It was found to be a rock having the appearance of volcanic production.

An ingenious Frenchman has invented a contrivance for removing the hair by machinery. It is said that it operates with as great precision as Dr. Guillotin's and does not remove so much of the man with the hair.

By virtue of an execution issued by Judge Bartlett on Dec. 16th, Rev. T. De Witt Talmage's tabernacle has been seized by the sheriff to satisfy a judgment of \$1,104.88 obtained on behalf of Alfred Tong, a painter, who painted the church after the fire in 1889 and has not been paid. An officer is in charge of the seized property.

A turkey fair was held at Smith's Falls on Dec. 16th, and was well attended both by buyers and sellers. The prices for turkeys ranged from 10 to 12 cents and from 6 to 7 cents for geese. There will be shipped, in all probability, from this point between 80 and 90 tons of fowl, as the purchases have been fully up to that of any previous year.

Intense cold and heavy snowfalls are reported from North and Central Spain. The whole of Central and Southern Russia has been visited for three days with an exceptionally severe blizzard. Such severity has been unknown in Moscow for eight years. All railways but the Nikolai are more or less snow-blocked and direct communication with the south interrupted. Some lines are entirely stopped.

It is officially announced that the queen, at the request of the Government at Washington, has decided to loan for exhibition at the Chicago fair Leonardo da Vinci's original drawing of the first map of America, now in the queen's collection at Windsor castle. The officials of the British museum have agreed to permit the copying of any documents bearing upon the early history of America, for exhibition at Chicago.

The Chinese of the United States are going to try and upset the Chinese exclusion bill by a joint effort. The constitutionality of the Act will be tested; mass meetings will be held and Congress flooded with petitions, and finally the Chinese Government will protest. If this fails China will retaliate by ceasing all relations with the United States and withdrawing her protection from 1,500 Americans within her borders. A poll tax to cover expenses of \$1 a head will be levied on all Chinamen in the United States.

The Times London cable says:—"The historic indisposition of English politicians and editors to mind their own business is displaying itself just now in an effort of certain Liberal newspapers to boom Edward Blake as the proper leader of the Irish National party. I suppose the effort is well meant, but it rather taxes the patience of Irishmen to act as if they liked it. Blake may be useful in the house, particularly as the English seem much struck by his Canadian oratorical methods and his fine head of hair, but there is no earthly prospect of his being considered as a possible successor to Justin McCarthy."

On Friday evening Mayor Harvey held an interesting reception in the Council Chamber. Five young misses were brought before his Worship charged with coasting on the side walks, and the room was crowded with school children, young and not so young, all keenly interested in the result. The nuisance had become unbearable, and the Mayor, after hearing the evidence, discharged the culprits with a distinct warning that the next coaster brought before him would be fined. Several accidents had resulted from the practising of coasting and skating on the walks during the two or three days previous, some of them rather serious.—Orillia Packet.

CORRESPONDENCE.

To the Editor of the Fenelon Falls Gazette.
DEAR SIR,—
As the time is approaching when the rate payers of this village will be called upon to nominate and elect a new reeve and council, I thought I would take the liberty of making a few suggestions, which, if followed, might perhaps be beneficial to the guidance of all interested in securing a good reeve and council. Before doing so, however, allow me to make a few observations which may lead us to consider the matter. Our village has not improved much during the last few years, but, I fear, on the other hand, has shown some signs of decay—a fact not to be attached to our council or councils exactly, never-the-less,

sounding a warning note that if we will again have animation and prosperity in our midst, we will carefully care for what we already possess, and proceed cautiously along the lines of expenditure, thereby lessening the rate of taxation. That we have enterprising men in our village cannot be denied, as has been shown by the erection of the fine skating rink, which has just been completed, after only a few weeks having elapsed since the project first started. There is plenty of material out of which to select a first class council. The reeve and council constitute the guardianship of the assets of the corporation. They should then be men—*sober, reliable, responsible, temperate and moral.* They should be men who would constantly consider that their reputation was at stake for the manner in which they fill the positions to which they shall have been elected. It is all very fine for men to seek honors at the hands of electors, and then allow the affairs of the village to drift with every wind that blows.

There are many questions which may confront the new council. What about the McDougall versus McArthur case, in which the corporation, I understand, is liable to figure in the matter of the law costs: has it been settled yet? What is likely to be done in the matter of fire protection? It was absolutely disgraceful to this village to have the fire protection in such a state of uselessness at the recent fire. Good work has heretofore been done with hand engines in this place; but when part of the hose is locked up, and no person responsible for the condition of the rest of it, or the other appliances, it is no wonder that whole blocks burn down, in the presence of scores of men who could and would work, if only officered. This "happy go lucky" state of affairs has existed long enough, and it is hoped, whether the old council or a new one be elected for the ensuing year, they will consider themselves the custodians of the public weal, and manfully stand forth for every measure which will financially or morally improve our village.
