The Czar's Crazy Cousin.

ODESSA, Dec. 31.-Letters from Tashkend report that General Baranok, who recently died at that town, and is generally believed to have been poisoned by persons having cause to apprehend the results of the administrative reform which he was about to introduce in Turkestan, had been deputed to investigate and report upon the conduct of the Grand Duke Nicholas Constantinovitch, the Czar's cousin, who has lived in exile in Central Asia since the painful drama which, twenty years ago, brought about the disgrace of his Imperial Highness. The Grand Duke's manner of living in the remote Central Asian city is described as strange beyond measure, so extraordinary indeed that many people suppose him to be either demented or addicted to habits of intemperance. His tyranny to those about him is excessive, and all the people trembie at his approach. Lately the Grand Duke has had a magnificent palace built at Tashkend, but he lives in an old and dilapidated building with his wife, a person whom he married in a fit of eccentricity, and whom he constantly beats. Another of the peculiarities of his imperial highness is to wear, at home and abroad, a native robe, or Khalat, which resembles a robe de chamber, and is neither rich in appearance nor free from rents. At his orders are twenty Ural Cossacks, who carry out his every command with blindest obedience. The prince has caused people who have offended him to be buried up to the necks in the sand, while their heads were left exposed to the burning son. A doctor who was subjected to this treatment became insane.

Tried to Eat His Arm.

A HEARTRENDING STORY FROM THE PACIFIC COAST.

SPOKANE, Wash., Dec. 31 .-- Charles Hall and Alex. Parker, lumbermen, eleven miles up Cœur d' Alene river from Kingston, walked to town on Saturday to buy food. They could not get their cheques cashed, and started for home with a quart of whisky but no food. The next morning a party of travellers found Hall in the show, semiconscious and delirious, with hands and feet frozen and one side of his face like solid ice. He may recover, but is still delirious. Parker's body was found frozen stiff. His clothing was torn and all the flesh had been torn from his left arm and hand. Some of the flesh still hung to the bone in frozen strips, while the remaining portion was lying in bloody patches of snow. It was at first believed that the flesh had been torn from the arm by dogs, until a long strip of half chewed flesh was found hanging from his teeth half concealed by his beard. His lips were bitten through, and one shoe, which had been removed, showed three toes had been bitten off. In one pocket was found the check, and on its back Parker had tried to serawl a message but only two words, "hunger" and "torture," can be read.

Salt Will be Cheap. CLINTON, Dec. 31 .- In an interview

with the secretary of the Canada Salt, association, he has supplied the following. for publication :- "The Canada Salt association dissolved to-day. Although the prices charged by the association have been exceedingly moderate, and, notwithstanding the fact that the large bulk of traders are fully in sympathy with the arrangement, yet, owing to the. new wells that are coming into operation at Mooretown, Windsor, etc., it was felt impossible to continue. The saltmanufacturers feel especially aggrieved that a public institution like the C. P. R., which owes its inception and its present existence to the large sums of money that have been given to it by the taxpayers of the Dominion, should condescend to enter into a needless and wasteful competition in the manufacture of salt. The prices at which salt can now be obtained will be low enough to satisfy the most patriotic Patron of Industry."
