DROWNED.—Last Saturday evening Mrs. Norman Fetterley and her brother, Joseph Mitchell, were drowned by the upsetting of a punt in which they were crossing Gull river near Muden; but we have no information as to how the accident occurred.

ACCIDENT.—On Thursday morning Mrs. Oliver, widow of the late Elijah Oliver of North Verulam, slipped and fell on a piece of ice near her own door, breaking her left wrist. She was immediately driven to Dr. Wilson's office in Fenelon Falls and the fracture dressed.

BUILDING.—Mr. S. S. Gainer, carriage maker, who commenced business in the Falls a few months ago, has leased a frontage on Francis street east from Mr. James Knox, and has just commenced the erection of a building 20 x 40 feet and two stories high, which will be more than twice as roomy as the rented premises he has hitherto occupied.

RUNAWAY.—On Wednesday afternoon the Bobcaygeon stage team, while standing at the railway station here, took fright at the approaching train and started so suddenly that the lines were jerked out of the hands of a lad on the platform who was holding them. They ran at such a rate that they were somewhat "blown" by the time they reached Colborne street, where they were cleverly caught and stopped by Mr. Robert McGee of Fenelon. No harm was done beyond a trifling damage to the sleigh, which collided with the side of the swing bridge.

A GOOD DEED.—We are glad to hear that subscriptions are being taken up in aid of the widow and children of the late Mr. John Mark of Fenelon, who was burned to death, with his mother and daughter, on the 6th inst. Mr. A. Clark, Sr., who took charge of the Fenelon Falls list, has collected about \$33 in cash and expects a trifle more, and in addition to this 300 lbs. of flour and some articles of furniture have been donated by residents of the village. Subscription lists are, we understand, being circulated in several different

localities, and contributions in money or money's worth are made by almost all who are asked for them.

LINDSAY.—No fewer than three fires occurred in Lindsay last Friday night, the most destructive being at the Queen's hotel, owned by the Lundy estate, Peterborough, and occupied by Mr. Alex. McArthur. The fire, which left nothing of the building but the outer walls, is supposed to have been caused by a stove put in the fire to keep the beer from freezing. The loss on the hotel is estimated at \$5,000, of which \$3,500 is covered by insurance. The contents were insured for \$1,200. The fourth and most disastrous (as it involved loss of life) occurred on Wednesday of this week, when Mr. Wm. Walters's house was burned down, and a lad named Martin, who was helping to remove the contents, was struck by a falling chimney and perished in the flames.

Canadian Order of Foresters.

The Canadian Order of Foresters is a fraternal benevolent society, incorporated in 1879, and registered under the insurance corporation act, 1892, of Ontario. The objects of the society are to furnish its members with sick and funeral benefits and an insurance of one or two thousand dollars. The payment of these benefits range from about one dollar to one dollar and fifty cents per month, according to the age of the member, and the amount of insurance carried. The membership is composed of men only, and when admitted they must be between the ages of eighteen and forty-five. The present number of members is over 16,000, and the society has a cash surplus on hand for the payment of the insurance of over \$215,000, \$50,000 of which is in Dominion of Canada bonds, and the balance is invested in the best monetary institutions of the Province. In addition to this, courts have about half a million of dollars in their treasuries for the payment of the sick and funeral benefits. The high secretary of the Order is Mr. Thomas White of Brantford, and it is expected that a court of this popular and purely Canadian society will shortly be organized here.—49-3m.

The city of New York cares for 18,000 lunatics at a cost of \$625,000 a year.

Malcolm Forbes of Boston paid \$45,000 for Nancy Hanks, and she is reported to have won \$33,000 for him in exhibitions last year.

The sea water originally put in the great aquariums at the Crystal Palace, Sydenham, in 1854, is said to be still used there, having been used over and over since that time, a record without parallel in the history of similar institutions.

An erratic clock adorns the post-office in Gallatin, Mo. A philosophic farmer says of it with quiet sarcasm: "Whenever the clock in the post office strikes eleven and the hands point to half-past twelve, I know it is just a quarter to ten."

A sixty-four-year old citizen of Deering, Me., is suffering from his first attack of toothache. All his teeth are sound, and the one that is troubling him has defied all the efforts of the dentist to extract it, the root seeming to be twisted around a part of the jawbone.

Surprise and terror caused some zinc miners to desert a shaft they were sinking at Webb City, Wis. As the opening became deeper, they noticed that the atmosphere became warmer. At the depth of 63 feet the heat was so intense that work was stopped, and soon they saw flames burst into the shaft.
