The District Court at Everett, Mass., has decided that a storekeeper is guilty of keeping a gambling house who sets up in his place of business a nickel-in-the-slot machine which may put forth a cigar or may present only a fortune telling card.

A despatch from Port Louis, Mauritius, reports that a cyclone swept the island, doing almost incalculable damage to property and killing and injuring many persons. A crowded railway train was blown from the track and rolled down an embankment into the Coromandel river, killing fifty persons and injuring a large number of others.

Cod, herring and halibut are reported scarce in Newfoundland waters.

A Japanese in Sendai the other day inserted an advertisement in a local newspaper in which he announced that wine drinking was ruinous to a man's purse, and that henceforth he intended to abstain except when he was invited by others to drink at their expense. Signed, Takahashe Ryozobara.

Jacob A. Moore, aged 85, and Mrs. Jane Raymond, his housekeeper, aged 90, were brutally murdered in their house at Monticello, N. Y., on the night of February 22nd. The assassin used a scissor shovel, a cordwood stick and a revolver to accomplish his ends. There is no clue to his identity. Robbery was evidently the incentive.

Another phenomenal oil well put in an appearance in the Fostoria field, Ohio, late on the afternoon of February 24th. It is now flowing oil at the rate of 7,500 barrels per day. For the first half hour it spouted oil as high as the derrick and was a wonderful sight. It is known as the Carter well, and is on the property of David Carter, an aged negro, who heretofore had made a living by peddling vegetables. He will receive one-eighth of the production, which will insure him a small fortune. The well is owned by Emerson & Steele, of Fostoria.

Belleville Ontario: "Benjamin Vanorman, Rossmore, who has been in the lumbering district of Nipissing for the past six months, returned home yesterday, having had to quit on account of the deep snow, which does not enable them to find timber after it has fallen. The snow is five feet on the level and the temperature has been down as low as forty-five degrees below zero. Much inconvenience is caused by the cold weather, as many were suffering continually from frost bites. Mr. Vanorman has travelled nearly three hundred miles, and it has taken him over a week to get home."
