A Row AT THE STATION. - On Thursday morning two men named John Garvin and Daniel Regan boarded the Haliburton train at Irondale Junction, and when nearing Fenelon Falls got into a row with a number of men belonging to Howry's lumber camp. During the stoppage of the train here the dispute was continued on the station platform, and Garvin was knocked down by one of the party and immediately pounced upon and kicked by four or five others. In response to a telephone message acting constable Northey speedily arrived on the scene and arrested Garvin and Regan, who were subsequently brought before Magistrate Dickson. Garvin, whose left eye was badly disfigured, was acquitted, as the evidence showed that he probably would have taken no part in the disturbance if he had not been provoked; but his companion Regan, who, as well as some of Howry's men, was under the influence of liquor, and appeared to have been the principal cause of the trouble, was fined \$10 and costs \$3.10, which he paid forthwith. During the row on the train the bell-cord was severed, pulled into the smoking car and tied around the legs of the stove, and a coupling pin which had been removed from be tween two cars was found in Regan's pocket.

For being an accessory to the use of a cancelled postage stamp, James Gibson of Stockdale was fined \$20 and costs at Wooler on Saturday before Mr. T. R. Garratt. The information was laid by Assistant Postoffice Inspector Macarow of Kingston.

Adam Haber, a carpenter of Lake View, near Chicago, was shot and killed by his son, George, about 12 o'clock one night last week. A quarrel between Haber and his wife was the cause of the tragedy. The husband struck his wife and the son ran into the room and fired six shots at his father. Five of them took effect. The father dropped to the floor dead. Young Haber is 20 years old. He was locked up soon after the murder.

Reports from the Newfoundland seal fishery are very discouraging. All of the steamers have had poor fares. The Newfoundland has 6,000, which were taken on March 8, six days before the law allows. She has one of the best catches of the whole fleet. The male seals are inshore. The people at northern parts are out hauling them by thousands. The Labrador had two men killed on Tuesday, one being cut into two pieces by ice.

In the House of Commons on Thursday Mr. Herbert Gardner, Secretary of Agriculture, stated that the Imperial Government had on Friday received from the Canadian Government representations that the Dominion was now free from pleuro-pneumonia.
