ACCIDENT.—Last Friday Mr. Henry Pearce's fourth son, Willie, who is in the employ of Dr. Wilson, led one of the doctor's horses out of the stable yard and then jumped on its back for the purpose of riding it to the creek a few rods up the street. The sidewalk is a good deal higher than the roadway, and from the one to the other is a short steep platform or bridge, which the horse descended so suddenly that the boy was thrown over its head and dragged at least twenty yards by the halter, which was twisted around his left hand, and by some means one of the bones of the arm got broken just above the wrist. The accident will of course lay him up for a considerable time, but will do no lasting injury, as he is only about fourteen years old and as healthy as he can possibly be.

The Prince of Wales Speaks.

LONDON, April 16.—At the festival dinner given at the Middlesex Hospital the Prince of Wales, who presided, offered a toast to the army and navy, the defenders of the Empire. He expressed his gratification at the decision of the Government to increase the navy, which, he said, was the bulwark of national defence. On this subject His Royal Highness said: "God forbid that it should imply any threat to other countries. It is just the reverse, for in order to be at peace, we must be strong. Therefore, it is the best policy to strengthen the first line of defence—the navy. I hope the motto of which our volunteers are so proud, that of 'Defence, Not Defiance,' may ever be retained by the navy." The speech was loudly cheered.
