#### Wheat Prices May Not Rise.

In an interview with an Empire re-

porter on Monday afternoon, Prof. James W. Robertson, the Dominion Dairy Commissioner, said he did not believe in Mr. Van Horne's prophecy that the price of wheat would go up to \$2 a bushel. He thought that unless in the event of a great war, or other catastrophe, the scale of prices of grain was likely to remain low. The cheapness of labor in Russia and India, and the reduced cost of agricultural implements and other machinery, were bound to keep the price of wheat at a minimum figure. Another point Mr. Robertson made in favor of dairying was that the farmers would get a larger share of what was paid by the ultimate consumer, if they paid more attention to butter and cheese making. For instance, the freight charges on a tub of butter and a bushel of wheat from Montreal to Liverpool were the same. The bushel of wheat brought perhaps 60 cents, while the tub of butter sold for perhaps \$12 or \$15. Concentrated products, then, seemed to be what Canadian farmers should devote their atten tion to more than they do at present.

An annuity of \$200,000 a year paid for the maintenance of the rice industry in Canada, which only gives employment to 75 men, is a pretty blamed expensive way of encouraging manufacturing.

It has been discovered that Felix Fenton, the anarchist office clerk who was arrested on April 26th, was acting as a medium of communication between anarchists in England and Germany and their friends in France. He received a large number of letters daily, and the police are trying to trace their

Whitby has a by-law which stipulates that "no horses, sheep, cattle, goats. swine or poultry shall run at large, with the exception of a milk cow for each ratepayer, and this cow must be giving milk at the time she runs at large." This is the richest specimen of by-law architecture yet.

The bad packing of Canadian apples is militating against their popularity in England. Too many people put large, juicy fruit in the ends of the barrels, and scrubby dried up culls in the centre, and the Englishmen won't stand it, ba Jove. Sharp practices of this kind may work once or twice, but there is a limit to human endurance, and if the Canadian apple sellers wish to retain a profitable market for their fruit, it will be to their interest to act on the square.

An exchange says that an appeal is made in the press to the farmers of the country to be on guard against the new agricultural pest, the Russian thistle, which is said to be more dreaded than the Canadian thistle, which has gained such a foothold in our country. The Russian thistle was imported in some flax seed to Scotland, South Dakota, seventeen years ago, and has in that short space of time spread over 30.000 square miles of territory. The damage to crops the past year from this enemy is placed at \$2,000,000.




