LAUNCHED.—The alligator tug mentioned in last week's *Gazette* was launched on Friday evening in the small bay beyond Mr. John A. Ellis's mill, and it was a strange sight to see a steamboat on land "splurging along in search of water." She is 37 feet long by 10 feet wide—a foot more each way than we stated—is quite new and cost \$3,000, without her 5,000 feet of wire cable, which cost \$500 more. Her engine is of 20 actual horse-power, but her gearing multiplies the traction power by six, so that she can pull as much as 120 horses. She was manufactured by Messrs. West & Peachy of Simcoe, and Mr. John C. West, a member of the firm, came to the Falls to superintend her removal from the flat car on which she arrived to her "native element."

The City of Montreal has entered an action against the Street Railway Company for overcrowding the cars.

The new Lehigh Valley engine No. 655 ran from Buffalo to Rochester on Tuesday at the rate of 85 miles an hour.

A cyclone in the Chickasaw nation, Texas, blew down 20 houses and injured a number of people, some fatally.

William Oldham, of Nottingham, England, will start during this month to cross the Atlantic on a water cycle.

It is thought an organized band of kidnapers are at work in St. Louis, Mo. Five children have mysteriously disappeared.

The leading London Jews are about to combine to exclude from the privileges and honors of the synagogues all Jews who engage in money lending at usurious rates.

A party of tourists who were imprisoned in the stalactite cave near Graz, Austria, by a rise of water, have been released alive after being in the cave over two weeks.

It is thought the miners' strike in the States will end in a victory for the miners, as the supply of soft coal is getting so low that the mine owners will be forced to grant the strikers' demands.

Burglars at Lynn, Mass., blew open the safe of Torrance, Vary & Co. on Tuesday morning. The explosion also blew out the front of the building, and the scoundrels decamped without securing the \$5,000 in the safe.

A remarkable nugget has been taken out of the Smuggler Mine at Aspen, Col. It weighs 3,300 pounds and contains silver to the value of \$25,600. It is the largest silver nugget ever known and is almost pure.

It is said the Standard Oil Co. of the United States and the Russian Oil Co. have arranged to divide the entire markets of the world between them, the Standard taking in Britain, France and western Europe, the Russian company taking all the east.

An example of all good wives is that of a woman in New York, whose husband became melancholy and essayed to hang himself. She cut him down, boxed his ears, and then had him arrested. How could a man with such a wife become despondent?

Eighty years ago eight merino sheep were landed in Australia. These eight have since increased to 130,000,000. Our cousins at the Antipodes have an even greater source of wealth in their sheep runs than they possess in their gold mines.

Another landslide has occurred in Quebec, 23 miles down the river from the scene of the former one, at St. Alban. Five houses are said to have been wrecked. The C. P. R. bridge over the Batiscan river, at Ste. Anne de la Perade, is said to be in danger.

Mr. Edward Rosewater, proprietor of The Omaha Bee, has been sentenced to imprisonment for 30 days and to pay a fine of \$500 because his paper criticized the judge of the District Court. An appeal to the State Supreme Court secured his release from prison shortly after he was taken there.
