Evolution of an Anarchist.

The Anarchist Henry, just before his execution, made a speech which may help to explain a social phenomenon which perplexes and alarms the publicists of the old world. Henry said that until about the middle of 1891 he had lived among people imbued with the existing morality, and had been accustomed to respect, and even to love, the principals of patriotism, family authority and property. The change in his sentiments may be best described in his own words:-

" I had been told that life was easy and amply open to the intelligent and resolute, but experience showed me that only the cynical and the fawning can get a good seat at the banquet. I had been told that social institutions were based on justice and equality, but found about me only falsehood and roguery. Every day took away an illusion from me. Wherever I went I witnessed the same suffering in some, the same enjoyments in others, I was not slow in comprehending that the big words I had been taught to veneratehonor, devotion, duty-were merely a mask for the most shameful turpitudes. The manufacturer who built up a collossal fortune on his workingmen's labor, while they lacked everything, was an honest gentleman. The Deputy, the Minister, whose hands were always open to bribes, was 'devoted to the public weal. The officer who tried the new model rifle on children seven years old had done his duty, and the Premier in Parliament had offered him congratulations."

Mundella's Resignation.

The Right Hon. Anthony J. Mundella, whose resignation of his position in the Cabinet as President of the Board of Trade grew out of his connection as director of the defunct New Zealand Loan Company, has addressed a letter to his constituents in the Brightside division of Sheffield, explaining that he resigned because he did not wish to cripple the machinery of the department over which he presided. Had he occupied any other post under the Government he would have remained in office and ignored the unjust criticisms of his enemies, but as President of the Board of Trade he would necessarily be obliged to pass judgment upon the affairs of the New Zealand Loan Company, as well as on the evidence taken before the recent public enquiry into the administration of the affairs of that concern, and it would be unbecoming in him to officially be considered. certify to his own acts in a private capacity.


