To the Editor of the Fenelon Falls Gazette.
SIR—
As an elector, and one who supported the present council at the last election (but am sorry for having done so), I would like to have an answer from its members to a few questions.
1st. What cause of complaint has the reeve of his assessment being too high on his house, when Mr. Dickson, on the same street, on one-half the amount of land and no out-buildings of any account, is assessed \$300 more than he is? and the house lately occupied by Mrs. Cunningham and owned by Mr. Greene, with one-half as much land, and not as good a house, assessed \$100 more than he is? His shop is assessed for \$200 less than Mr. Campbell, his next-door neighbor, and his personal property at one quarter as much. What cause of complaint has he here?
2nd. Mr. Sandford complains of being too highly assessed on his flour mill, factories, etc., at \$2,000, while he admitted on the night of the nomination that they were worth \$6,000 at least. How does he find any cause for complaint here? Does he claim that his house is not as good as Mr. John Shane's, which is assessed for the same amount? also Mr. Wm. Deyman's?
3rd. If this council thinks the stone mill is not highly enough assessed, why did some of them not appeal against it, and show that they had the courage of their convictions?
4th. The assessor (who was their own choosing) seems to have suited every one only themselves. Can they tell me how this is?

Death of Edmund Yates.

THE WELL-KNOWN WRITER OF COURT GOSSIP AND NOVELS PASSES AWAY.

LONDON, May 20.—Edmund Hodgson Yates, editor and proprietor of *The World*, died to-day. Mr. Yates was the son of the well-known actor, and was for some years chief of the missing letter department in the post-office. He was theatrical critic on *The Daily News* for six years, and was himself the author of several dramas. In May, 1872, Mr. Yates retired from the post-office in order to devote himself exclusively to literature. In the course of that year he went on a lecturing tour in the United States, and in May, 1873, he was appointed London representative of the *New York Herald*, which post he resigned in July, 1874, when he established *The World*. Mr. Yates was, in the year 1884, indicted for having published in his paper a libel on the Earl of Lonsdale, for which, as editor, he was responsible. He was sentenced to four months' imprisonment, but was released before two months had expired. He was the author of many novels.

A large dam broke at Kittanning Point, Pa., on Sunday night, and a locomotive was sent out to warn people living below of their danger.

In a railway collision near Standing Rock tunnel, Ky., on Saturday, a conductor and six workmen employed on a pile driving train were killed.

The case of G. Decker, of Yreka, Cal., is a strange one. He is either a desperate criminal or a much-wronged man. Six murders were laid at his door; but his first wife, whom it was said he killed, has turned up alive, and so has the "murdered" babe, whose "bones were dug up."

A new industry was inaugurated at Port Arthur on May 19th by the arrival of the tug *Mystic* with barge in tow for a load of baryta from McKellar's island. It is proposed to transport this to Duluth, then grind it and use for adulteration of white lead and mixing with paint generally. The vein of it on McKellar's island is said to be the largest in the world.
