Anonymous and Inaccurate.

(From the Toronto News, Conservative.) An anonymous campaign sheet, called an "Eye Opener," has been very extensively circulated in Toronto. This | 2-20 sheet professes to show the respective sums given by the Mowat Government to Protestant (or public) charitable institutions and those controlled by the Roman Catholic Church.

According to the statements made, Protestant or public charities only receive a little over \$29,000 as against upwards of \$35,000 allowed those of the minority. This assertion is wholly inaccurate, as anyone can see by a reference to pages 245 to 248 of the public accounts for 1893. The inaccuracy consists in the first place in misstating the total of the Provincial grants for charitable purposes, these being placed at some \$65,000 when they are in reality nearly \$100,000 over that amount. In the second place a whole list of well known Protestant or public-institutions are omitted from the statement altogether. Amongst those left out are the General Hospital, Toronto, to which the Province gives \$24;-067, the Hospital for Sick Children, that is granted \$7,266, the Home for Incurables, Toronto, that is given \$5,charities, the grants to which run from

a few hundreds to over \$6,000 each. It is surprising that any man would issue, even anonymously, statements the falsity of which can be so easily proven and the only effect of which must be to assist the Government that is subjected to such groundless attacks.

The loss by the Frazer river flood is estimated at \$4,000,000, and it is said 15.000 people are homeless.

The wife of Jacob Gaudaur, the champion oarsman, died suddenly at Orillia on Friday night. Mrs. Gaudaur was highly respected.
