The recent hot wave touched all parts of the continent.

Saturday evening's storm did considerable damage to crops and fences in the neighborhood of Whitby.

A despatch from Paris says sixty cases and fifteen deaths from cholera have occurred at Jeneppe, near Liege, Belgium.

A terrific storm visited Watertown, N. Y., and vicinity on Sunday, doing great damage to crops, buildings and fences.

The town of Keighley, Kansas, was almost wiped out by a cyclone on Monday night. Many people are said to have been killed.

A ten-year-old boy named Laroque, of Lachute, Quebec, bought some tobacco a few days ago and began to chew it. He swallowed some of the juice and it killed him.

At Harcourt, N. B., Bert McKay, 23 years of age, accidentally cut his finger, and afterwards got some poison, supposed to be Paris green, into the cut. He died in great agony two hours later.

There was a terrible storm near Charleston, West Virginia, last Friday. Trees were snapped off and fences blown down. Many crops were ruined. Lucy Watts, the nine-year-old daughter of Gen. Watts, United States District Attorney, was killed by lightning.

Never before in the port of Baltimore was seen such a large tropical fruit fleet as arrived on Thursday of last week. Ten schooners came in from the Bahama islands with 65,574 dozens of pineapples. The cargoes ranged from 5,000 to 9,000 dozens. It was impossible to handle the great amount of fruit. Several of the vessels were sent outside the harbor to keep the cargoes cool until wanted.

Mr. Charlton's Sabbath Observance Bill got a six months' hoist in the Senate on Friday.

A party of excursionists near Tralee, county Kerry, Ireland, picked up an old shell near an artillery camp and began rolling it along the ground. The shell exploded and killed three of the party and wounded a dozen others.

The steamer from China reports that a band of pirates, with eight junks, recently planned to attack Tanchi, a walled village in the district of Hsinning Quàngtung. The villagers, learning of the intention, procured the assistance of some Yamen runners and soldiers, so that when the pirates arrived they were surrounded by a force of 500 men. There was a desperate fight, in which thirty-two pirates were killed and three captured. Three of the junks were seized and many pirates were drowned while trying to escape to their squadron. Eight villagers were wounded, one mortally.
