## Notorious Robber Killed.

LUNA, THE BORDER BANDIT, AND HIS WIFE, SHOT DOWN BY SOLDIERS.

CITY OF MEXICO, Aug. 20 .- The killing of the famous border bandit Luna and his wife by a troop of soldiers, 40 miles from this place has caused great rejoicing at Tamalejis. The soldiers came unexpectedly on the notorious couple, who immediately took refuge behind some rocks and opened fire. The soldiers returned it and killed them both. Luna's wife as usual fought by shooting when killed. They had committed hundreds of robberies and six assassinations. The dead desperado was imprisoned for two years in the Texas penitentiary, but, making his escape, had been a terror for several

## A Terrible Affair.

ONE HUNDRED PASSENGERS THROWN INTO THE VOLGA -SIX LIVES LOST.

St. Petersburg, Aug. 19 .- A des-CANADIAN HOME CIRCLES. FENE- patch from Rybinsk, an important commercial centre, situated on the right bank of the Volga river, states that a terrible storm passed over that city on Friday last. The damage done to property was immense. The steamer Uspiekh, plying on the river Schexna and the Volga, was caught by the storm on passengers on the vessel and they were thrown into a state of panic by the tremendous force of the wind, the furious downpour of rain, and the almost impenetrable darkness. The captain, knowing that his vessel was in danger, headed for the beach, his intention being to run her ashore. Before this could de done, the vessel sprang a leak and began to founder. As she sank METHODIST CHURCH - COLBORNE her decks were blown up by the air in boats. Despite the fury of the storm, passing vessels which had heard the Uspiekh's signals of distress, stopped and managed to rescue everybody except the captain and five other persons. Nothing was seen of the six after the steamer foundered, and it is conjectured that they were drowned.

## Seizing Sihps in the Tyne.

VESSELS BUILT FOR THE BELLIGERENTS NOT ALLOWED TO LEAVE BRITISH PORTS.

London, Aug. 20 .- The government OT. ALOYSIUS R. C. CHURCH-LOUISA has ordered the custom officers of Newcastle to seize, under the foreign enlistment act, a torpedo catcher built at the Elwich works on China's order, and to detain the vessel until she shall have been condemned and released by process

> Government officers have gone aboard another vessel in the Tyne because they were convinced that she was fitting for service in the Chinese-Japanese war. The work on the vessel has been pushed with the greatest haste since the declaration of war, and recently materials of war have been placed aboard her. As far as can be ascertained neither China nor Japan ordered the vessel. It is thought that she may be fitting merely for speculative purposes, her owners intending to offer her to China or Japan after getting away from English waters. Despite the presence of the officers work on the vessel has not been stopped. More seizures of vessels are expected. The steamer Alaska, which China bought before the war from the Thames Iron Company, lies in the Thames. She is an armor clad carrying rapid firing guns. She is understood to be shipping her crew.

A despatch from Vienna says that 20,000 Mannlicher rifles made in Austria have been shipped to China.

Texas fever bas killed 400 head of native cattle in Eastern Kansas.

A genuine water trout of 81 lbs. was recently caught by a local angler on the Tweed at the Hedge End, Boldside, Selkirkshire.

A Montreal company with a capital stock of \$40,000 is applying for a charter from the Dominion Government, giving them power to manufacture playing cards.

Word comes from China that Canton and neighborhood are permanently affected with the plague. Soil taken from a depth of two feet shows a greater number of bacilli than any part of the anatomy of the plague patient.
