Patrons and Twine.

WINNIPEG, Sept. 16.—The Manitoba Patrons of Industry considered last year that they were paying too much for their binder twine, and this year determined to go into the binder twine business themselves. The result is not satisfactory and the Patrons are disgusted. Briefly, the facts appear to be that the Patrons imported a large lot of twine from St. Paul and disposed of it to members at a price which they anticipated would be the lowest, but turned out to be the dearest in the market. The summary of the result is that 600 feet of the twine supplied by the Patrons cost 10 cents, while a superior brand from Kingston cost 8 cents, a difference in favor of the latter of \$45 per ton. It further appears that the actual cost of disposing of the Patrons' twine to the members of the order was a quarter of a cent greater than that charged by regular dealers.

Cholera in Russia.

ST. PETERSBURG, Sept. 15.—The official cholera report shows that from Sept. 8 to 14 there were 82 cases of cholera in this city, and 50 deaths from the disease. In Warsaw, during the same time, there were 35 cases and 16 deaths. For the period from September 2 to 8 the following figures were given for the Governments affected: Lomza, Poland, 23 new cases, 16 deaths; Petrikau, Poland, 823 new cases, 259 deaths; Kovno, Western Russia, 42 new cases, 20 deaths; Minsk, Western Russia, 100 new cases, 44 deaths; Podolia, Western Russia, 446 new cases, 175 deaths; Bessarabia, South Russia, 453 new cases, 158 deaths; Nijni Novgorod, Great Russia, 179 new cases, 76 deaths. From August 26 to September 1, not counting the above provinces, there were 1,348 cases and 733 deaths. From Aug. 12 to September 8 there were 910 new cases and 494 deaths in the Government of Plotsk, Poland. From Aug. 27 to September 9 there were 535 new cases and 347 deaths in the town of Nijni Novgorod.

The Cat For Ruffians.

LONDON, Sept. 15.—Violent crimes and their punishment have occupied a large share of public attention in London during the past two or three days. At the same hour on Thursday afternoon, when the great diamond robbery was taking place at Hatton garden, a judge at the Old Bailey was sentencing four of the greatest ruffians in London to long terms of penal servitude, coupled with liberal doses of the cat. The rascals have been the leaders of a gang worse than any that ever infested New York. They made the Seven Dials district and Drury Lane the most dangerous spots in London. For many months they had defied the police, and it was only after a desperate fight, following a highway robbery in broad daylight, that they were captured. The Judge announced his intention to make exemplary use of the cat, which put a stop to garruling in London many years ago. The leader was sentenced to 24 strokes and the others to a dozen each, besides hard labor, for from 8 to 14 years. The prisoners did not seem to mind the imprisonment, but the sentence of the cat terrified them.

The Winner of the St. Leger.

The defeat of Lord Rosebery's Derby winner, Ladas, in the St. Leger is the event of the week to the great majority of British racegoers, but the greatest surprise to the sporting world is the record of Throstle, the winner. She started in the betting at 50 to 1, and was unknown outside the private club of which her owner is a member. The joint sharers in Throstle's winnings are Lord Alington and Sir Frederick Johnstone, who backed her heavily and won immense sums. At a private dinner at Lord Alington's on the eve of the race it became known that every guest present had backed Throstle. Half an hour before the race the secret leaked out and the odds diminished rapidly. When Throstle was foaled she was blind because of a film over her eyes, and Lord Alington, her owner, ordered her to be killed or given away. She was kept, however, and in three months she was able to see. She is now regarded as the leading mare of the world. Experts who have examined her pedigree find that she is related to Eclipse, Eleanor, Petrarch, Thistle, Common and other Derby and St. Leger winners.
