## Verulam Council.

The council met at the town hall, Bobcaygeon, on Monday, Sept. 10th, at the call of the reeve, Jas. Lithgow, Esq., in the chair, deputy-reeve John Kelly, and councillors John Lewis, Wm. Mann and Jas. Akister were present.

A by-law levying the taxes for 1894 and a by-law exempting dogs and bitches from taxation were passed.

The collector was allowed an abatement of \$3.50 on John Johnston's taxes on north-east quarter lot 32 con. 8; and having completed the collection of the '93 rates, his sureties were released.

A by-law was passed authorizing the issue of debentures running 12 years, for \$650, for the purpose of U. S. Sec. No. 11, Verulam, Fenelon and Harvey.

Moved by J. Kelly, seconded by J. Lewis, That Robt. McFarland be appointed collector at a salary of \$75.—Lost.

In amendment moved by W. Mann, seconded by James Akister, That John Johnston be appointed collector at a salary of \$90.—Carried.

Moved by Jas. Akister, seconded by John Lewis, That this council respectfully calls the attention of the Fenelon council to the dangerous condition of road past J. D. Naylor's place, from his gate westward, and urges the removal of his fence farther to the south, as it is represented that the said fence encroaches on the highway.—Carried.

**CHANGED HANDS.**—The commodious dwelling-house immediately west of the North Star roller mills, has recently changed hands, Mr. Broad, by whom it was built a few years ago, having sold it to Mr. C. **TRENT VALLEY CANAL.**—The *Empire's* Ottawa correspondent, writing on the 17th inst., says: "Mr. Collingwood Schreiber, chief engineer of railways and canals, returned from the Trent Valley district to-day. Since Tuesday of last week he has made a thorough inspection of the line of the proposed Trent canal work from Peterboro' to Lake Simcoe. In about three weeks' time tenders will be called for portions of the work, on which construction is to be commenced without delay, namely, the 9-mile section between Peterboro' and Lakefield, and the 14-mile section between Aros, on Balsam lake, and Game Bridge, on Lake Simcoe. Between Aros and Lakefield there is at present uninterrupted water communication."

Her husband had been a public charge, but the widow had been neglected; her only companions were two dogs, also emaciated by hunger.
