THE RED MILL.—The wires for the electric lights were put up in the red mill last week, and a dynamo sufficiently powerful to supply not only the mill but the yard has been purchased and may be here any day. The mill is to have 125 lights, some of 200, some of 300, and some of 500 candle-power, and the yard will have about the same number, but not until next year. The mill, so far, has been lighted mornings and evenings by means of large coal-oil lamps with reflectors behind, which answer the purpose fairly well, but electricity will be a great improvement.

A CLOVER MILL.—On Tuesday afternoon a handsome new clover mill from Sawyer & Massey's works at Hamilton passed through the Falls on its way from the station to Mr. W. H. Stevenson's farm in Verulam. The mill, which is about as big as a thrashing machine, is called the Monitor, is well finished and handsomely painted, and must have cost a good deal of money, though we could not learn the exact price. It is, we are informed, the first clover mill ever brought across the Fenelon River, and its presence in the locality will no doubt cause an increase in the quantity of clover allowed annually to go to seed.

NEW WEIGH SCALE.—Mr. George Martin has, by permission of the council, put up a new four-ton (Gurney's make) weigh scale on Helen street, a few yards from its junction with Lindsay street, which will be a great convenience to the farmers who have sometimes had to cross the long bridge below the falls with a load to get it weighed and then had to haul it back again to the purchaser. There are now three good reliable scales in the village—one at the North Star roller mill, one at the stone mill between the canal and the river, and Mr. Martin's.
