MYSTERIOUS.—Mr. Robert Kittle, of the 7th concession of Verulam, has two farms, upon one of which he lives, and upon the other, which is a mile and a half farther north, he turned loose, some time in September, seven young steers, six of which he found dead when he went, one day last week, to see how they were getting along. As Mr. Kittle is a peace-loving, kindly man, who hasn't an enemy in the world, it is not at all likely that the animals were poisoned, and Dr. Mason is of the opinion that they died of anthrax, a disease of the blood that generally proves fatal in a few hours, and of which the doctor has had several cases during the five or six years he has been at the Falls. Anthrax has its own especial "microbe," which an animal may pick up while grazing or inhale through breathing infected air. The steers, some of which were coming two, and the others coming three, years old, had been dead so long that they were partially decomposed, which is probably the reason why a post mortem examination was not held.

At a bull fight in Pueblo, Mex., one of the bulls dashed among the spectators, injuring eight persons.

R. A. Turner, of Brantford, owner of the trotting dog Major, suicided on Friday by swallowing carbolic acid.

The roundhouse of the Intercolonial railway at Riviere du Loup, Quebec, on Saturday, and eight locomotives were destroyed. Loss, \$200,000.

Maria Hartley was acquitted at Brantford on Saturday on the charge of murdering her husband, Caleb Hartley, at New Durham on May 13th last.

Felden, one of the anarchists convicted at Chicago, sent to penitentiary, and afterwards pardoned, intends to go farming and will not aim at being an orator.

Thirty-five years ago Mrs. Milton Stevenson, of Georgetown, Ky., ran a piece of broken glass into her hand. Last week the glass was taken out at the elbow.

It is said that a man at Heming's Corners, Tenn., shrieks once a month from 180 to 110 pounds and remains in that condition for a week, after which he regains his original weight.

The Ottawa dairy buildings, situated four miles north of Winnipeg, were burned to the ground last Friday night. Seventy-three head of cattle and two horses were cremated. Loss, \$12,000.

A large boarding house, filled with Hungarians, at Laurel Run, Pa., was blown to atoms by dynamites on Saturday. Three inmates were killed, four fatally hurt, and half a dozen seriously injured.
