This would be a Sweeping Reform.

When the late Chief Justice Harrison was at the head of the bar in Ontario his highest earnings were, it is said, \$7.000 per annum. Two or three years ago the leading commercial lawyer of Toronto was credited with an annual income of \$15,000, while two or three eminent jury lawyers were in receipt of as much as \$25,000 apiece.

This is one phase of the law question. Another is found in the fact that it is no unusual thing, in a suit involv ing \$400, for the costs to reach \$700. And who gets the big pull at these costs? It is not the hard-working solicitor who spends perhaps six months over one side of the case. He will get possibly \$150, out of which \$60 will represent disbursements, while the eminent counsel, who appears in court for a day and a half, will walk off with the other hundred and fifty.

But the evil is working its-own cure. Costs have reached such outrageous figures that men of business are seeking some means of escape. This is the principal reason why arbitration is coming so much into favor. "In fact," said the barrister from whom the foregoing facts were obtained, " do not be surprised if a demand soon arises for the abolition of both juries and lawyers in all civil actions and the substiaution of a tribunal consisting of three judges, one of whom shall present the ease for the plaintiff and another the three being left to weigh the evidence on both sides and give his decision accordingly."- Toronto News.

The Canadian cruiser Petrel took to Roudeau on Monday night over a hundred United States gill nets seized near Pelee island.

In New York 2.800 loaves of bread, with other provisions, have been distributed among the striking cloakmakers, who are in great distress.

James Liddle, editor of the Preston, lowa, Times, wrote up his own suicide and then went and killed himself, carrying out the programme to the letter.

A gang of bricklayers in Sarnia went on strike on Monday because, it is said, a member of the P. P. A. was put to work. They went back when the P. P. A. man was discharged.

In New Haven, Conn., there are 42 cases of typhoid fever. Many of the people who are ill attended a society dinner at which raw oysters were served, and it is believed the unusually large number of cases are traceable to these oysters, which are thought to have been fattened in water through which sewage flows.


