A PARIS ANARCHIST THROWS A BOMB, WOUNDING TWENTY PERSONS.

PARIS, Feb. 12 -Edon Breton, 24 wars old, threw a bomb in the cafe of the Hotel Terminus at the St. Lazare railway station this evening. The bomb exploded in the middle of the room and wounded twenty persons. An instrumental concert began in the cafe, which is on the ground floor of the hotel, at 8 o'clock. Shortly before 9 a pale, thin young man, with a light, pointed beard, paid for a drink which he had taken at a table in the middle of the room and started to leave. When near the door he turned suddenly, drew a bomb from his coat and threw it toward a group of persons who sat next to him. The bomb struck an electric light fixture, then fell on a marble table and exploded. The great hotel and station were rocked by the shock. The mirrors, windows and doors were blown to atoms. The ceiling and floors were rent and the walls were cracked. A dense offensive smoke filled the cafe for four minutes, and in the obscurity the bomb-thrower D: 1894. escaped.
