

Repeal the Corn Law.

The National policy has proved a veritable Pandora's box to Canadian farmers, who for more than a dozen years have been patiently enduring all the ill effects of a jagged protective system, while vainly hoping against hope for the time to arrive when the bloated monopolists would relent a little and, perhaps, permit some of the most flagrant abuses of protection to be removed, or at least toned down a little. If ever there was a time when the farmers had a right to expect speedy deliverance from the evil effects of some of the more obnoxious decrees of the Red Parlor, it was when so many of the Conservative members of Parliament and editors were demanding their removal; but it seems that the results of all this mountainous labor is a despicable mouse of "make believe," which are not intended to be of real benefit to the farming community, for the slight reduction in the tariff on binder twine and coal oil will be manipulated by trust combinations in such a way that the farmer will gain nothing whatever but the pleasure of hearing the old, old story repeated as of yore, "Live horse and you'll get grass." At the present juncture, when Canadian stockers are excluded from the British markets, the admission of free corn to help forward the good work of changing these superfluous stockers into fat, marketable bullocks would seem the most natural thing for a sensible government to do, especially as the corn duty does not contribute directly to the congested pockets of the gentlemen who own the governmental machine. But the integrity of the precious National Policy must be upheld at all hazards, and the removal of the corn duty might prove the entering wedge which would ultimately lead to serious dislocation of the tentacles of the N. P. octopus. Hence the purchased press is again warning Canadian farmers of the danger to their best interest in the form of lower prices of coarse grain and the weakened constitution of Canadian porkers by the admission of cheap American corn. It is said that corn is not equal to peas in the manufacture of pork for the British market, but it cannot be denied that corn is most desirable in the rations of fattening bullocks, while it adds very much to the value of the manure pile, and were all peas fed to the hogs and plenty of American cheap corn imported to put more fat on the beeves and more cream on the milk, the wisdom of such a course would soon become manifest in the increasing crops and profits of Canadian farmers.—*Montreal Witness.*

Canadian Order of Foresters.

The Canadian Order of Foresters is a fraternal benevolent society, incorporated in 1879, and registered under the insurance corporation act, 1892, of Ontario. The objects of the society are to furnish its members with sick and funeral benefits and an insurance of one or two thousand dollars. The payment of these benefits range from about one dollar to one dollar and fifty cents per month, according to the age of the member, and the amount of insurance carried. The membership is composed of men only, and when admitted they must be between the ages of eighteen and forty-five. The present number of members is over 16,000, and the society has a cash surplus on hand for the payment of the insurance of over \$215,000, \$50,000 of which is in Dominion of Canada bonds, and the balance is invested in the best monetary institutions of the Province. In addition to this, courts have about half a million of dollars in their treasuries for the payment of the sick and funeral benefits. The high secretary of the Order is Mr. Thomas White of Brantford, and it is expected that a court of this popular and purely Canadian society will shortly be organized here.—49-3m.

A hog killed at Seio, Oregon, was found to have two perfect stomachs and two complete sets of intestines. The owner never noticed anything unusual about the animal when it was alive, except that it had a wonderful appetite.

The Salvation Army paraded the streets in Saginaw the other day carrying only a British flag, and aroused the patriotic zeal of Police Clerk Wentworth, who told the officers in most emphatic terms that they must carry also the American flag along with the other.

Squirrels are very plentiful and destructive in some parts of the state of Washington. Lincoln county paid out \$40,000 in bounties on squirrel scalps last year, yet but little good effect was produced. It is proposed to tax all the lands in the country to raise funds to fight the pest, and so make railroads and non-resident owners help in the work.

The Earl and Countess of Aberdeen have taken passage for America on the steamship Teutonic, which sails from Liverpool on April 19. Later on they leave for British Columbia to spend the summer on their Canadian ranch. It is not believed that Lord Stanley will relinquish his duties before the autumn.

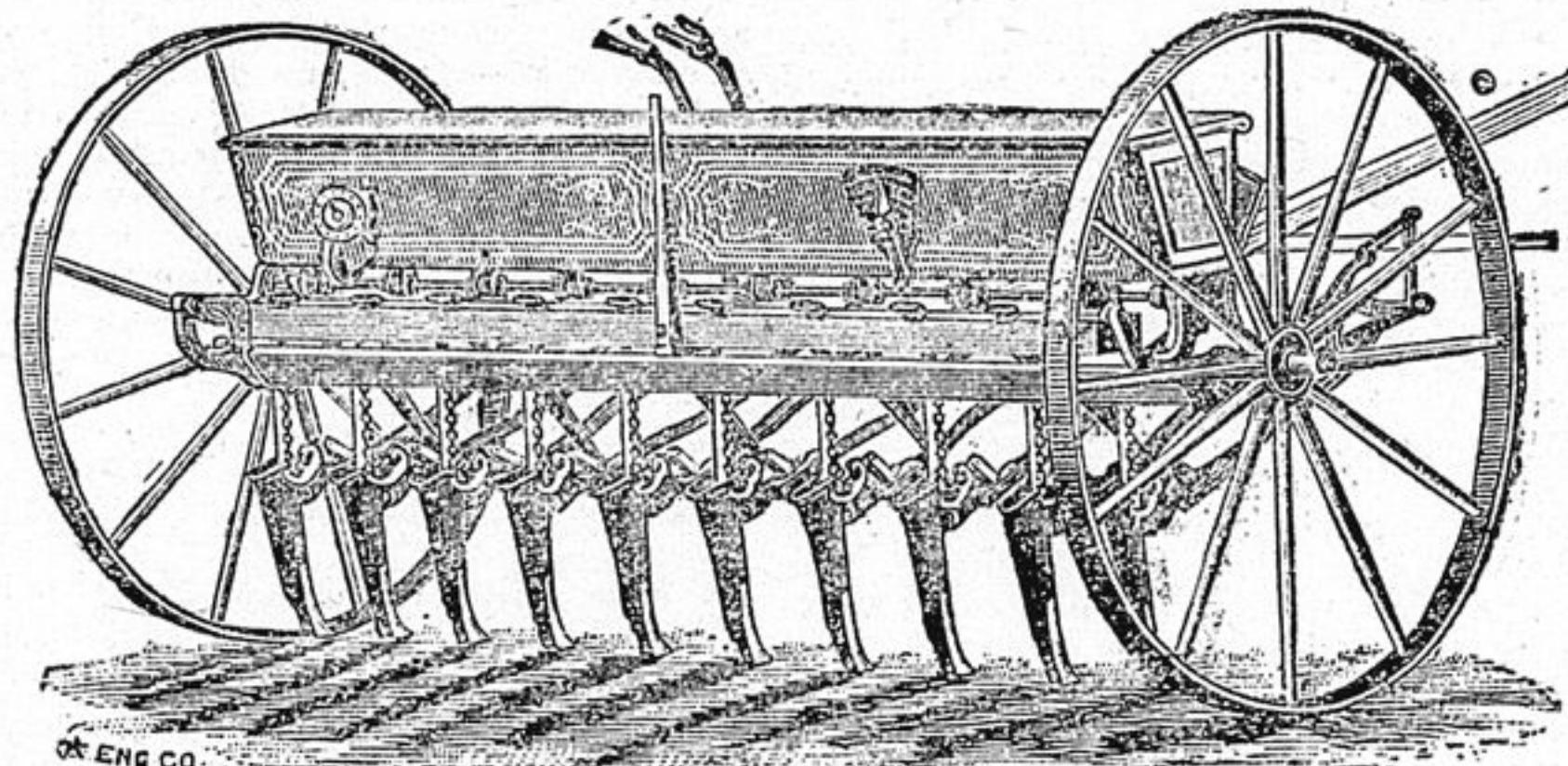
