

New Uses for Water.

SCIENTIFIC EFFORTS TO TURN IT INTO LIGHT, HEAT AND POWER.

One of the most interesting processes now going on, says a San Francisco exchange, is the conversion of water into light, heat and power. The great obstacle in the way of cheap electric lights and power has been the cost of coal and other fuel. But all over the northwest water is being utilized for running electric plants. An electrician who has recently been looking over Montana and the northwestern states finds that everywhere water power is being taken up and utilized to create electricity. So cheap is this process that the use of coal is out of the question. No light and power can be created so cheaply as that where a mountain stream has been made to do the work. What was an experiment a short time ago has now become one of the most remarkable industrial developments of the time. In nearly all the northwestern states which are hilly and mountainous these water powers are abundant. Swift streams are flowing down everywhere. These streams are just what electricians want. Finding a stream anywhere within five or ten miles of a thriving town, they are ready to light that town and furnish power cheaper than it ever could be furnished by the use of coal. This, to a great extent, is the practical solution of the question of cheap light, heat and power. It will not be available in many large cities, although it has never been settled as to the distance that this power can be transmitted with economy.

But just where coal is dear in many of the small towns there is a prospect that light, heat and power will be cheap. The neglected streams that were thought of little consequence have already assumed such importance as they never have before. As long as electrical energy was generated from coal they seemed to be a great hindrance to its universal use. But if every little mountain stream is to be utilized, then, next to good coal mines, the streams will become of the greatest importance. What was hardly more than an experiment three years ago has been carried to such practical success that electricians are now saying, give us a good mountain stream and we will insure cheap light and power and even heat, without the use of a pound of fuel.

Successful Tracheotomy.

The friends of the family will be glad to learn that little Willie Graham, grandson of Mr. Wm. Lech, is making rapid strides towards recovery, and is now practically out of danger. The little fellow was seized with an attack of pseudo-membranous croup on St. Patrick's Day, and was rapidly choking to death. Finding all attempts to procure relief unavailing his medical attendant, Dr. Brennan, with the advice and assistance of Dr. Pigeon, who had been called in consultation, performed the operation known as tracheotomy, opening the little sufferer's windpipe and inserting a tube through which the breathing is still carried on. It is said to be many years since this operation has been successfully performed in this section of the country, and it will be a source of congratulation to all if the little patient finally recovers, which he promises to do at present.—*Peterboro Examiner.*

Tomatoes and Cancer.

In a late issue of the London Times appeared a letter to the editor containing the following:—"There is a very prevalent idea that eating tomatoes is an exciting cause of cancer, and for the last two years we have been so inundated with letters on this subject that the Medical Committee of the Cancer Hospital would be greatly obliged by your publishing in the Times their opinion—viz, that tomatoes neither predispose to nor excite cancer formation, and that they are not injurious to persons suffering from this disease, but are on the contrary a very wholesome diet, particularly so if cooked. We shall also be greatly obliged by other papers making this generally known.—Alex. Marsden, M. D., Chairman Medical Committee, The Cancer Hospital, Brompton, S. W., January 9th."

The imperial cholera commission in Germany announces its discovery that wine—claret or hock—will kill the bacilli of cholera in a few minutes. Tea will kill them in an hour.

On February 14, 1893, the Empire State Express of the New York Central left Syracuse 58 minutes late and made the run from Syracuse to Buffalo at the rate of 59½ miles an hour for the entire distance, 148 miles; this included a stop of two minutes at Rochester, and the train was obliged to slow down as it passed through more than a dozen towns. When it is understood that this was the regular train, consisting of four heavily loaded cars, it will be appreciated as a great achievement, even in this wonderful age of fast time.

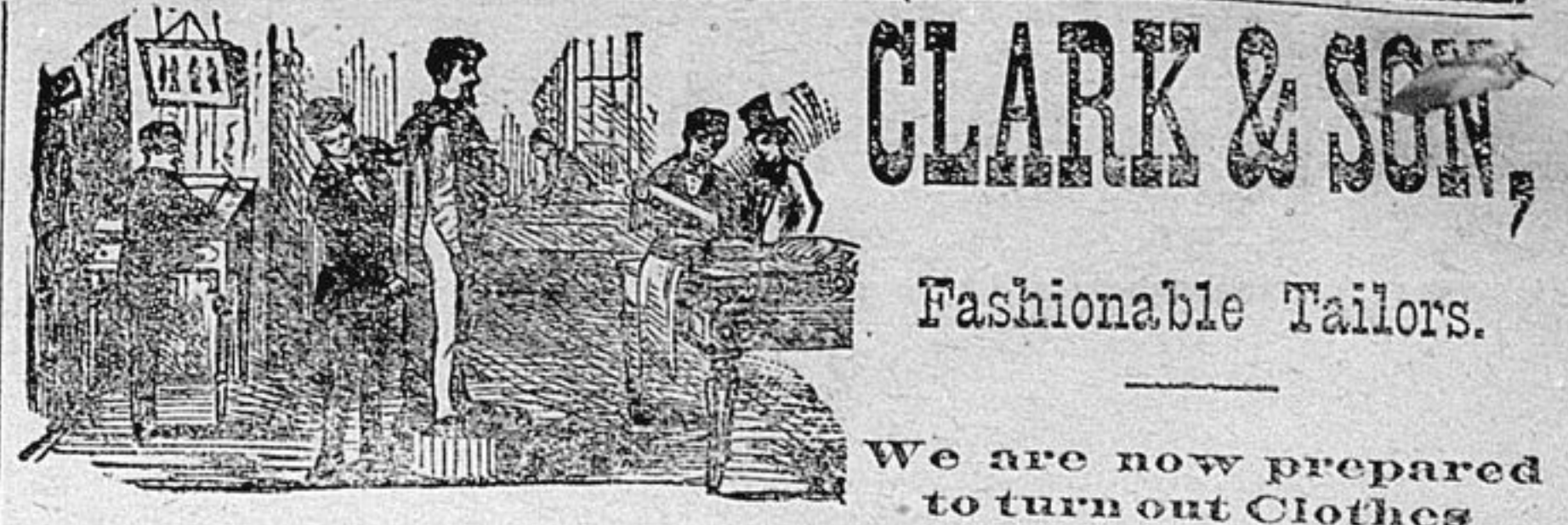

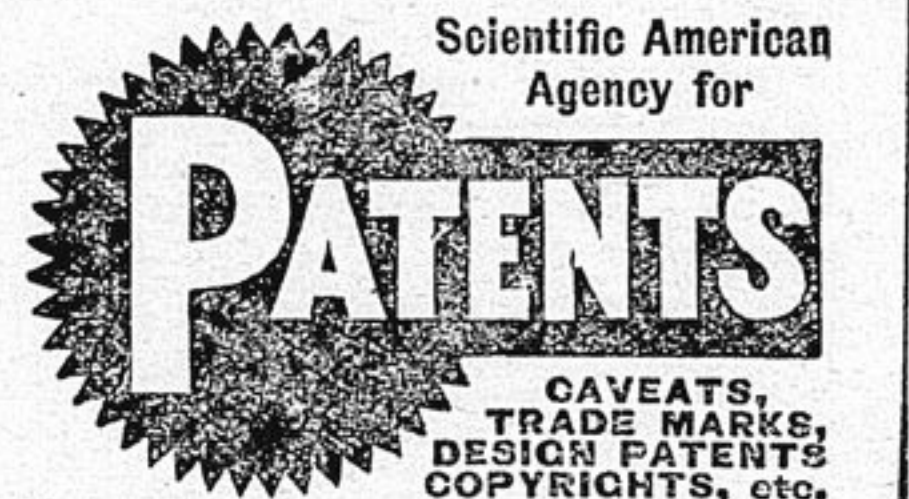
