The Coming Metal.

While in a Princess street hardware store to day a reporter was shown some key chains made of aluminum, a full dozen of which weighed only 2½ ounces; he was also shown a dog collar, made of the same metal, weighing just half an ounce. Aluminum is without doubt the lightest known metal in the world, and its field for usefulness is fast enlarging. Ere long it is likely to be much used in the construction of racing bicycles. An Englishman last year had a wheel made entirely of it, which, when finished, weighed only 8 pounds. Al though so extremely light, aluminum is as strong and capable of as much resistance as steel. It would supersede the latter as a material for the construction of armor plates were it not so expensive; at present it costs in Pittsburgh, Pa., 50 cents per pound.—*Kingston News.*

A California Tragedy.

SAN BERNARDINO, April 7.—One of the bloodiest and most revolting tragedies that ever occurred in this city is that in which Wm. Goldkoffer, a German, and Francisca Flores, a Mexican woman, were stabbed to death by Jesus Fuen yesterday morning. Fuen went to the house of the woman and, after a few words, drew a knife and attempted to kill her. She eluded him and ran across the street to the residence of Goldkoffer and appealed for protection. Goldkoffer, who was a cripple, attempted to shield the woman and was stabbed in a dozen places by the infuriated Mexican. Meantime the woman had again fled, but was pursued and overtaken, and the head was nearly severed from the body by Fuen. After killing the woman Fuen attacked another Mexican who had come to the assistance of the woman. The attacked man struck Fuen with a stone, rendering him insensible. He was secured and placed in jail, where he is closely guarded to prevent his falling into the hands of the infuriated citizens.

Clifton, a village just below Pomeroy, Ohio, was almost wiped out by fire on Sunday, April 9th. Twenty-five houses, three stores and the salt works were consumed.

CORRESPONDENCE.

To the Editor of the Fenelon Falls Gazette.

DEAR SIR,—

As the annual cleaning up season is again at hand, I would ask humbly, and respectfully to call the attention of our village fathers to the state of the Market Square. Some years ago the council leased a part of it to a certain firm to pile wood on, for \$10 per annum. Is that rent still being paid for it? If so, it does not appear in the auditors' report. If the lease has expired why is the place not cleared up, as the council of the day promised it should be? One of the members of that firm is now also a member of the council. Is he, in the first year of his public life, going to take advantage of his position to save his purse the few dollars it would cost to clean up that spot and leave it as he got it? The Square seems to be a general dumping ground for all parties living thereby. Are they not required to dispose of their rubbish on their own premises?

There is another matter to which I wish to call attention. A matter which every person from the Mayor and Chief of Police down seems afraid to grapple with. But perhaps in this case I ought to address the Board of Health. There is a slaughter house in one of the most densely populated parts of the village, in which it is currently reported killing was carried on during the past winter. It may be all very well to say "Oh, we keep pigs there and all the refuse is eaten up, so there will be no bad smell." This answer may be all very well so far as it goes. And pigs personally may be very cleanly animals, but their places of residence are not noted for their cleanliness, and they are not generally looked upon as the most desirable neighbors. I have been informed—perhaps wrongly—that by statute all slaughter houses must be not less than two hundred yards distant from any dwelling house. If such be the case it should be a sufficient answer to any argument that it is not a nuisance, even though Tom and Hank are both interested in it. Last season complaint was made to the Board of Health that a poor man had a slaughter house within the prescribed limits, and he was promptly dealt with. Let the health department now buckle on their armor and do their duty even at the risk of Tom's adjectives and Hank's dark looks. A few weeks ago a petition signed by upwards of seventy ratepayers was presented to the council. One of the members said it was a piece of impertinence on the part of the signers. Another is reported to have used language which no decent newspaper would print—language which could only be conceived in a foul brain, which could only be uttered by dirty lips. So I suppose I shall catch it for this. Well, even if I do, I won't sit down and cry over it, and in the meantime subscribe myself

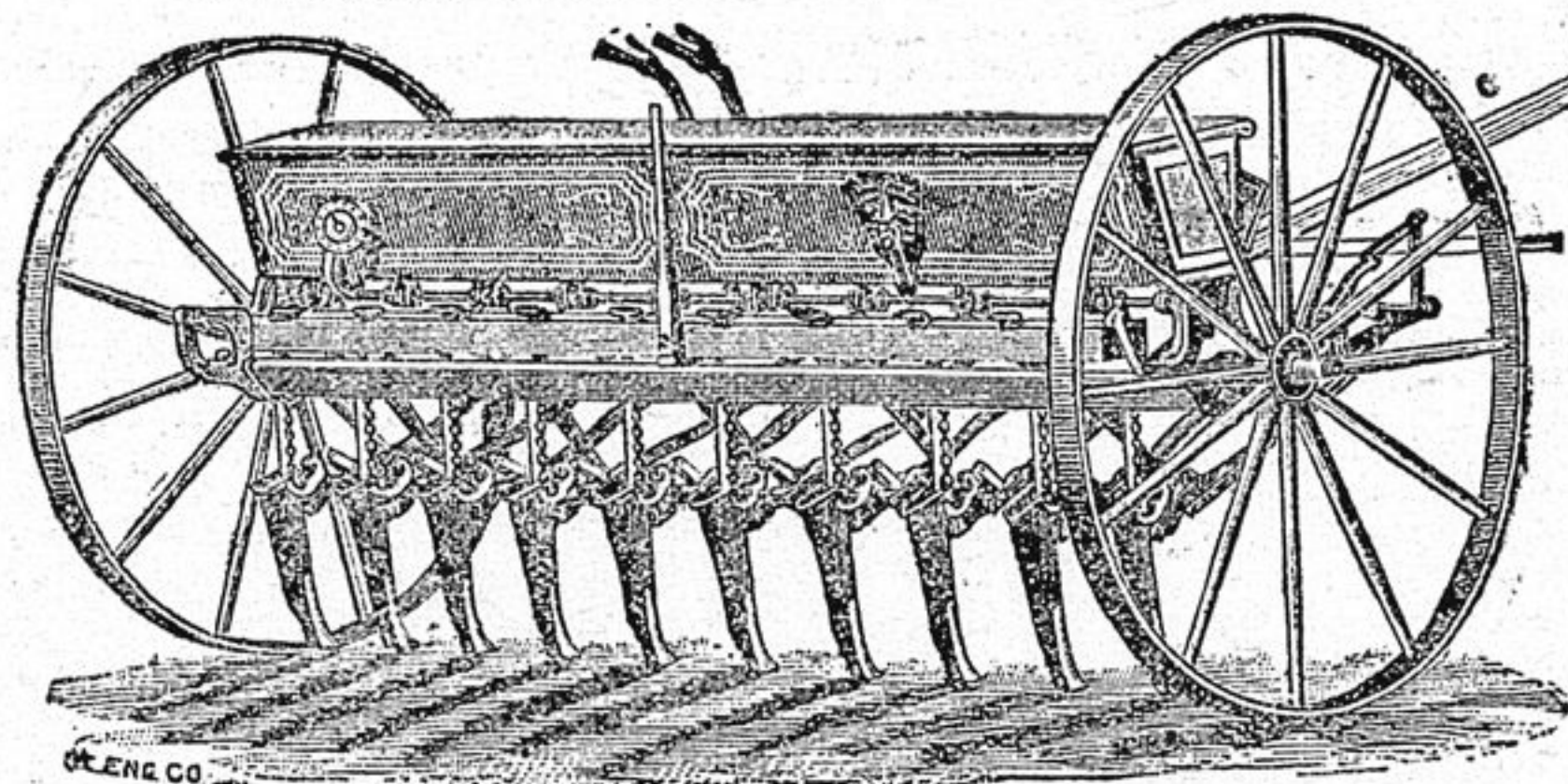
