**ALMOST A FIRE**—A little before 11 o'clock last Friday night the roof of a house owned and occupied by Mr. Robert Taggart, south of the river, caught fire from a defect in the chimney. The mill bell immediately began to ring the alarm, a number of neighbors hastily assembled, and, plenty of water being close at hand, the fire was extinguished before any damage was done except to the roof, which was badly burned.

**THE CHEESE FACTORY**—Work was commenced on the new cheese factory in Verulam last Monday morning, and it will be finished at the very earliest possible moment—probably by the middle of June. At the Fenelon Falls factory preparations are being made for the season's operations, which begin on the first of May; and on Monday next waggons laden with the shining cans of the milk gatherers will be seen passing through the village streets.

**WHEN?—**The *Warder* told us not long ago that the swing (railroad) bridge is going up this summer, and we are anxious to know when preparations for the work are to be commenced. The \$10,000 given to the G. T. R. Co. last year and the \$3,000 recently voted were both intended to be spent on the bridge or in connection with it, and if they are not expended this summer there will be much disappointment in this locality.

**IN A WELL**—Last Friday afternoon a roan cow owned by Mr. J. Twomey, Jr., of the Mansion House, fell into a well behind a house on Francis street, in consequence of some boards laid over it, and on which she stepped, breaking beneath her weight. Fortunately, she went in tail end first, and when seen was trying to climb out of the well, which is ten or twelve feet deep and was nearly full of water. A few men

soon assembled, pulled her out by means of a rope and took her to her owner's stable, which is only a few rods distant. She was terribly scraped and so cold that she trembled as if with the ague; but a warm drink, heavy blankets and persistent rubbing soon but a stop to the shivers, and by next morning she was all right again.

**CORRESPONDENCE.**

To the Editor of the Fenelon Falls Gazette.

DEAR SIR,—  
Mr. Austin is entirely in error when he accuses me of attacking any person in my former letter. I merely called the attention of the Board of Health to a long standing nuisance with the view of having it removed. He dubs me a disappointed office seeker. In this he is also in error, and has nestled down on the wrong eggs this time, or, as some would say, he is "barking up the wrong tree." The soon isn't there. An inklinger I may be, but I am not an office seeker, but his letter is an apt illustration of what some persons are capable of when they hold office. He has been appointed a member of the Board of Health. I understand this is his first public office he has ever held, and in evidence of his fitness for the position boldly asserts that he is the owner of what has been a standing nuisance for the past seventeen years, and in defiance of the statute has continued slaughtering animals there even after he had been appointed for the express purpose of rooting out all such. A few years ago the North Star Roller Mill Company kept hogs on their premises. No persons were louder in denouncing that practice than the owners of this very slaughter house. But the aroma of that hog pen never began to be a patch to theirs: He can blot away just as much as he pleases about my writing over a *nom de plume* and if it is any solace to his outraged feelings also hug the belief that I am afraid to do so. The only point at issue is, are my charges false, and that they are not he admits himself. Year after year there have been complaints of that slaughter house, and in the face of I might say annual promises to remove it, the nuisance still continues. Will the fact that the owner is now a member of the Board of Health make the odor arising therefrom any the less offensive or unhealthy and leave any person who has the hardihood to raise pen or voice against it liable to be dubbed an inklinger or disturber of the peace. Will his presence on the board so overrun the other members that they will sit quietly by and allow the thing to go on indefinitely? I fancy not. If it does they had better hand in their resignation, discharge the inspector, allow every cesspool and dirt centre to remain as it is, and not require Tom and Dick to toe the mark while Harry is given the run of the kitchen.

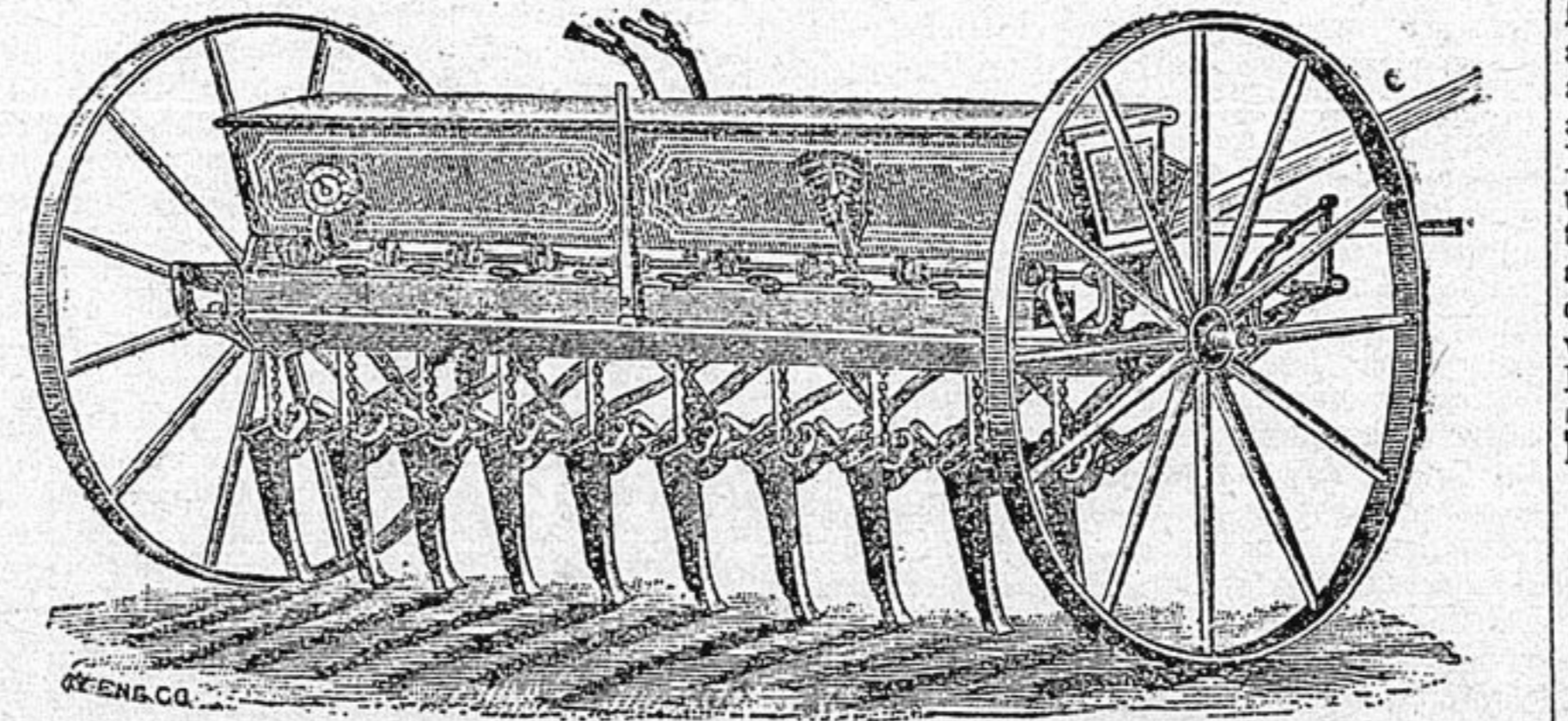
