**A "WASH-OUT."**—On Tuesday last about 200 yards of the railway track, where it is laid on a small embankment at the head of Burton's bay, three miles north of the Falls, was so badly injured by water that the mail train from the south had to lie here until 2 o'clock on Wednesday morning, when it was taken slowly and carefully over the spot, but the repairs of the track were not finished until 6 p. m. the same day. When the Fenelon Falls dam and slide were repaired last year, the former was raised twenty inches and the latter narrowed five feet and, as the total rainfall this spring was far above the average, the water in Cameron lake has been higher of late than it was ever known to be at this time of year, and for two or three days part of Helen street east of the railway was covered to a depth of over two feet.

## Left Her His Heart.

Carl Brandt, editor for many years of the Belleville *Zeitung and Stern*, the leading German paper in Southern Illinois, died a few days ago, leaving a remarkable will. He bequeathed his heart to his wife in Germany, and directed that it be removed and sent to her. The major was married in the Rutherford when a young man. He became estranged from his wife and came to this country. He often said that, although separated from his wife, his heart was still true to her, and that he would return it to her after death. The deceased had made a deposit with a friend in Cincinnati to cover the expenses. As soon as notified of his friend's death, the Cincinnati man telegraphed instructions and money for the removal of his deceased friend's heart. The heart is now in process of preservation and will shortly be shipped to the white-haired widow in Germany.—*New York Journal.*

A Penobscot county farmer, speaking of a former hired man in his employ, remarked quietly, "He's a pretty good sort of fellow, John is, but he's a little dull, a little dull." After a moment's further thought he continued: "It may be necessary to explain that a bit. I'll tell you how 'tis with him. I had a pretty nice field of onions growing, but they stood a little thick together and needed thinning out. So I told John he might do it. He worked away at them for a day or two, and then I went out to see how he was getting on. I found he had pulled up all the biggest ones and thrown them away, leaving only the smallest plants in the rows. I asked him what in creation he had pulled up all the best ones for, and he said 'twas to give the little fellows a chance, 'cos the big ones had crowded them, and they couldn't grow.' Salt has been struck on the Canadian Pacific railway well No. 2 near Windsor, at a depth of 1,125 feet. The building and apparatus required in the process of manufacture will cost \$125,000. One thousand barrels will be the daily output when the work gets well under way.

George Cavanaugh, a little child, died at Smith's Falls on May 19th under sad circumstances. Some member of the family had been using ammonia to relieve a toothache, and afterwards set the bottle containing it on the table. She had just turned around when the little fellow rushed up to the table and reached the bottle, and before he was noticed had swallowed most of the contents. He lingered in great agony until his sufferings ended with his life.

Robert Pearsall, who lives in Prince Edward, near Concession, was convicted on Friday, on complaint of Deputy P. O. Inspector Macarow, of using a cancelled postage stamp in forwarding a letter. It appeared that the prisoner had used a cancelled stamp on a letter addressed by him to a party in Crofton and which he posted at Belleville, the stamp used being in fact one which he took off a letter that he had received from the person at Crofton to whom he had written as above stated. This being a first offence, a fine of \$10 and \$3 costs was imposed.

Recent floods have devastated large districts in Roumania.

Locusts are ravaging nearly the whole province of Saratoff, Russia.

Severe shocks of earthquake occurred on Tuesday in and near Athens.

Eleven men were burned to death at Sand's lumber camp near Cadillac, Michigan, on Saturday.

All the cattle shipped per the Allan S. S. Numidian have been slaughtered at Liverpool. No trace of disease has been found in the lungs of the animals.

A box containing \$10,000 was unearthed at Des Arc, Ark., under the house of Stiles P. Catlin, an eccentric and miserly old bachelor, who died ten years ago.

Superstition finds odd manifestations even in most civilized Europe. The authorities of Frankfort-on-the-Main have yielded to the prayers of several landlords and omitted the number 13 in renumbering several streets. The owners declare that they could not rent apartments in houses bearing that number.

Joe Baird, a negro, went into a barnyard near Land, Ga., one day recently, when a bull ran at him, and pushed him against the wall of the barn, burying a horn in the legs on each side of him. One horn was broken and the other had to be sawed off to free Baird, who was not much hurt, but very much scared.

Kansas is coming to the front as a divorce state, her courts having severed the marriage tie in some five thousand cases last year. So easy is it to obtain a divorce that it is seldom one is refused when applied for. One result noted by a correspondent is that hasty marriages as well as marriages of those who are practically children are on the increase.

Mrs. Emma E. Forsythe is an American woman who goes by the name of White Queen. Her realm is an island in the Southern Pacific called New Britain, whose chief industry is the sale of mother-of-pearl. Mrs. Forsythe was left a widow at the age of eighteen, and with very little money. She now owns 150,000 of acres land, two steamers that ply between the island and the port, and she is preparing to close the contract for the building of four more vessels for the island trade.

It is said that a sharper is operating among the farmers in the vicinity of Kingston, his stock-in-trade being a patent ploughshare. The "nct" scheme is also worked in connection with this. And if farmers are not careful about what papers they sign for strangers, some of them will have their eyes suddenly opened when they will be presented with a note for the payment of a large sum of money. The scheme is an old one, and yet is generally successful. Farmers ought to be prepared for it.

A remarkable exhibition of instinct was displayed by a horse at Oil City one day last week. On Sunday night the horse was brought into the stable lane, and the stableman thought it was from a sprain. They were rubbing the leg with liniment on Monday morning, when the horse broke away from them and ran into a blacksmith shop in the neighborhood. Here he wheeled up to the horse-shoer and lifted up his lame leg. The man examined the leg and foot, and found that an improperly driven nail had penetrated to the quick of the foot. The shoe was reset and the horse returned to the barn.

Red Rose, a Dexter cow, seven years old, the property of Martin Sutton, a farmer of Reading, England, has just made record at the milking stool. She gained the first prize in her class at the last Royal Agricultural show. She calved at the end of March last year, and since then, during the twelvemonth from the 1st of April, 1892, to 1st of April, 1893, she has given a supply of milk which has amounted in the aggregate to a weight of 4 tons, 9 cwt., 3 qrs., 20 lbs., or, measured in the usual way, 983 gallons. Red Rose is a small cow, as all her breed are, and herself weighs just 900 lbs., so that during the year she has produced more than ten times her own weight.
