Gladstone Feared to be Failing.
Harold Frederic cables to the New
York Times:—Reassembling this week
after the holidays, the commons leaves
an extremely grim impression of Glad-
stone. For the first time he seems to
acknowledge his age, and to bow before
the impending shears. The old man,
always courtesy itself, seems to have
taken on transfiguration garments. He
is as subtle and dexterous as of yore,
but etherealized and deprecating, rising
with a warning finger like an ancient
sibyl to rebuke his unruly opponents,
who shrink before his apparition as from
a ghost, and grow silent when he rises
in the stormiest moments of the house,
and with weird aspect crows the bitter-
est of his enemies. But it is purely
personal, and stays no movement of the
general obstruction. Rumor whispers
among the Gladstonian disciples that
the old man is going, and an awe-struck
hush falls upon the turbulent assembly
when he rises. Enemies treat him as
if each speech might be his last, and
deferentially listen to a voice that fails
now and then, but is eked out with a
gracious gesture. Nobody dreams of
complaining that he cannot hear while
strangers in the gallery look of appalled
at the dumb show and reporters com-
pare notes to collate each syllable.
There is murmuring that Gladstone's
speech gets harder and harder to take.
With extraordinary tenacity he refuses
to allow Forley, Harcourt or anyone
else to steer the bill, and remains till
midnight fighting, fencing and rapiering,
as if in his prime. On Thursday he
remained after all his colleagues to put
through some trivial statute law and
revision bill blocked by the Tories, just
to enable a cheap revised volume of
statutes to be published. His Irish
sympathies daily find more marked
expression, and he turns continuously
towards the applauding Irish quarter as
if mutual reparations were being ex-
changed. The story goes that he fears
he will not last to witness the third
reading, and regards as a sacred charge
the duty of piloting the bill as far as he
can during his lifetime.

Badly Kicked.
At a late hour on Monday night
Robt. Hogeboom was terribly kicked
by a favorite horse and sustained most
severe injuries. The animal, a fine
young mare, had shortly before given
birth to a colt, and Mr. Hogeboom at
about 11 o'clock made a visit to the
barn to see that all was right for the
night. Just as he was about to leave
he noticed that the door to the manger
was shut and passed around the mare
to open it. As he passed behind her
she began to kick. Mr. Hogeboom was
knocked down in the corner and could
not escape. The animal kept up a rain
of blows and finally a terrible clip over
the eye knocked him senseless. His
son, Steve, and cousin, H. S. Hogeboom,
were aroused by the noise and rushed
to his assistance. They succeeded in
dragging the insensible man through
the window just in time to escape the
last vicious blow from the animal's
heels. An examination showed that
several ribs were broken, a deep gash
over the eye, a broken nose and a
terrible beating generally.—*Napanee*

Railway strikers at Mohacs, Hungary,
placed a dynamite bomb in a railway
coach on Friday. The bomb exploded,
killing one person and dangerously
injuring two others.

A triple murder was discovered on
the morning of the 3rd of June at Clav-
enceville, Misiquoi county, Que. Omri
Edy, his wife and daughter Emma,
aged 20, were murdered and the house
set on fire. The fire attracted the
neighbors, who saved the bodies. Plun-
der was the motive of the crime. There
is no clue as yet. Edy was a well-to-do
farmer and highly respected. He was
a leading member of the Methodist
church of Laeolle. The whole country
is aroused.

In Prince Edward Island, where
there was not a single cheese factory in
1892, twelve are to be in operation this
year. The industry has been of incal-
culable benefit to the Ontario farmer,
and there is no reason why its extension
to the Maritime Provinces should not
remove, to a considerable extent, the
stagnation from which that section of
the Dominion is now suffering. There
is no danger of over-doing the business.
Great Britain alone will furnish a mar-
ket for all the cheese Canada can produce
for many years to come.
