

THE PATRONS' EXCURSION.—Yesterday afternoon Fenelon Falls was full of Patrons of Industry, who arrived from different points by train, boat and private conveyance, those from Lindsay being accompanied by the members of the county council, who voted themselves a holiday and joined the crowd. After dinner addresses were delivered in Mr. Edward Fitzgerald's grove; but the affair took place too late in the week for us to give it more than a few lines of notice in this issue.

FISHING.—Bass and lunge fishing has now commenced, and, as usual, there are thousands of logs in the river to interfere with the sport. There is a division of opinion as to whether fishing can be legally engaged in before the 16th of June, and we used to think that it could not; but an abstract of the Ontario Game and Fishery Laws was some months ago printed on cards and circulated for the information of the people, and it is plainly stated therein that the close season for bass and maskinonge is between the 15th of April and 15th of June, which of course means that neither of these days is included.

EXCURSIONS.—Two, and possibly three, excursions from the Falls will be held the beginning of next week. On Wednesday, the 7th, the True Blues issued bills announcing a moonlight excursion to Sturgeon Point on the evening of the 20th; and on the 9th the Salvationists advertised an excursion to Lindsay on the 19th. This naturally "riled" the True Blues, who are now negotiating for the steamer *Alice Ethel*, on the 19th (Monday next), and, if they get her, they will run an excursion to Lindsay in opposition to the Salvationists, but at 15 cents instead of 25. A True Blue said in our hearing that the Salvationists played just the same trick last year that they are playing this, and that he and other members of his lodge will cheerfully sacrifice a week's wages each to prevent them making anything by their sharp practice.

The recent outbreak of smallpox at Winnipeg cost the city \$15,000.

Reino Lagimodiere, who was the first white child born in Manitoba, died at St. Boniface on Sunday, aged 95. Her mother died 18 years ago, aged 100.

Michael A. Redmond, the first white man born in London township, has just died at the place of his birth, having lived there the whole 73 years of his life.

New Scotland Yard, Victoria Embankment, London, is the largest police office in the world. It contains a room on the ground floor in which 3000 men can be assembled.

By the fall of Ford's old theatre at Washington, on Saturday last, while 450 clerks were at work, about 25 persons were killed and a much greater number injured. It was the building in which President Lincoln was shot by John Wilkes Booth in 1865, and was bought by the Government soon after the assassination and used as an army museum, but was pronounced unsafe several years ago.

CORRESPONDENCE.

To the Editor of the Fenelon Falls Gazette.

DEAR SIR,—

I was of the opinion that at a recent session of the Ontario Legislature a law was enacted to regulate canvassers for life insurance etc.; and, on enquiring of a local agent, I was furnished with a copy of the act, a section or two of which I append for the benefit of several parties in our neighborhood who have been flagrantly and wilfully disregarding the same. Section 27 of 55 Victoria, Chapter 39, of the Province of Ontario, "An Act respecting Insurance Incorporations," reads as follows:

27.—(1) After the 31st day of December, 1892, no person or persons, or body corporate or unincorporated, other than a corporation standing registered under this Act and persons duly authorized by such registered corporation to act in its behalf, shall undertake or effect, or offer to undertake or effect, any contract of insurance.

(2) If any promoter, organizer, office-bearer, manager, director, officer, collector, agent, employee or person, whatsoever, other than an agent in the next preceding sub-section, undertakes or effects, or agrees or offers to undertake or effect any contract of insurance, he shall be guilty of an offence, and, upon summary conviction thereof before any police magistrate or justice of the peace having jurisdiction where the offence was committed, shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding \$200 and costs, and not less than \$20 and costs; and in default of payment the offender shall be imprisoned with or without hard labor for a term not exceeding three months and not less than one month; and on second or subsequent conviction he shall be imprisoned with hard labor for a term not exceeding twelve months and not less than three months.

(3) Any person may be prosecutor or complainant under this Act; and one-half of any fine imposed by virtue of this Act shall, when received, belong to Her Majesty for the use of the Province, and the other half shall belong to the prosecutor or complainant.

(5) In any trial or cause or proceeding under this Act the burden of proving registry shall be upon the corporation or person charged.
