Crank Races to Chicago.

MILCH COWS WILL COMPETE NOW.

GALVESTON, Texas, July 3.—A milch cow race to the World's Fair has started from the town of Tyler, in eastern Texas, the home of Governor Hogg and the abiding place of numerous other Texas statesmen. Clyde Sederg offers a purse of \$5000 for the winner and \$1000 for second place. All herds will be allowed to enter, provided they are four years old or over. Applications will be received until July 13. Each person on entering a cow for the race will be furnished a two wheeled gig, a set of cow harness, one churn, one hundred pounds of meal, fifty pounds of bacon, ten pounds of coffee and cooking utensils with which to prepare their food. Drivers will be allowed to consume all the milk and butter they desire for their own personal wants en route. The cows are to be driven twelve hours a day, allowing one hour for dinner, and churning is to be permitted while travelling or at a stop. The cow arriving at the World's Fair first with not less than fifty pounds of butter to her credit, made en route, will receive first money. The cow having the largest amount of butter to her credit and arriving within one week or less after the winner will receive second money. Drivers are not allowed to walk, but must ride in the gig provided for them. So far six entries have been made and the start will be made from the Tyler Public Square, at 7 a. m., July 15.

Tempered Copper.

MONTREAL, June 30th (Special).—Herminand Allard, the Levis blacksmith who has discovered the secret of hardening copper, is in town on his way to Chicago. He has with him a cart, all the metal of which is this tempered copper. There is not an ounce of iron, not even a nail, in the whole carriage. The copper tires, which are about a quarter of an inch thick, are yellow, and almost as bright as burnished gold. The cart has already travelled many miles in every kind of weather, but there is not a particle of rust, nor the sign of a scratch on the tires or bolts or springs. The springs are the most marvellous portions of the mechanism. Were they made of ordinary copper they would flatten down like lead, and never recoil, but, as they are, the rebound is as gentle and elastic as that of the finest steel. Mr. Allard has with him a collection of tempered tools made of copper. Among them he has a cold chisel: that will cut iron like cheese. But next to his cart the most prized of all his exhibits are two plates, which prove the great resisting power of his metal. One of these plates is steel and the other is hardened copper. Both are about an eighth of an inch thick. The steel has been pierced through by a 50 calibre rifle bullet. The copper one has a similar bullet from the same rifle slightly embedded in its surface. With these two plates is a certificate testifying that the test was made by competent judges, and the copper has a far greater resisting power than the steel.

Warning to Employers.

The Court of Review has just rendered an important judgment in regard to the duties of employers towards workmen. A workman, named Rientard, had sued Messrs Robert & Co. The defendants have a window and sash factory, in which worked Rientard, who is a minor. One day his employers sent him to carry wood from the second to the third floor. Young Rientard was accompanied by another employe. On returning with the wood he fell down the elevator shaft, and in his fall met with some severe contusions, which obliged him to remain abed during one month. Thereupon arose the action for \$500 damages. Judge Mathieu held that employes are not sufficiently protected by law and that employers are obliged to see that no danger lurks in the pathway of the employes, and that, moreover, the employer must protect the workman against his own imprudence. In this case the Court decided that the employes, Robert & Co., did not sufficiently observe the law that they should have placed self-closing doors over the elevator shaft. Judgment therefore awarded plaintiff for \$75 and costs of an action for that amount.—*Montreal Star.*

The steamer Falcon, with Lieutenant Peary and his crew, sailed from Brooklyn on Sunday for the north pole. John Berry has been formally awarded first prize in the cowboys' race from Chadron, Neb., to the World's fair.

A French journalist, M. Lardeux, proposes to walk from Paris to Chicago, by way of Siberia. It is his intention to cross the Behring Straights on the ice. Thirty thousand Canadians and other British subjects listened to addresses in Festival hall, at Jackson Park, Chicago, on Saturday in honor of Dominion Day. The corner stones of the new Methodist Sunday school at St. Mary's were laid on Monday by Mr. H. A. Massey, Mr. W. Pridham, M. P., and Hon. Thomas Ballantyne.

The Batesville (Ind.) Herald says that a pensioner in Decatur county, drawing a handsome monthly stipend for total blindness, is the best 15-ball pool player in Decatur county.

Mr. Justice Rose has written a letter to Sir Oliver Mowat urging that the government should assume the control and management of the poor instead of leaving the matter to local authorities.

A fireman in the employ of the Boston & Maine railway recently found some Canadian bills stained with blood lying near the round house at Swanton, Vt. It is thought that this may be a clue to murderer of the Edy family at Clarenceville, Que.

Reports in reference to the crops, furnished by the Grand Northwestern Telegraph Company, have been received from nearly every county in Ontario, and it is shown that in every section of the province the prospects are of the brightest. Hay is now being harvested and in all parts the yield is abundant; while the outlook for wheat and other grains, as well as fruit, is most gratifying.

Great excitement has been caused in Thornhill, Yorkshire, by an explosion that occurred on July 4th in Ingram's colliery. One hundred and thirty miners are entombed, and it is feared that the loss of life will be heavy. Rescuing parties are hard at work, and four bodies have been recovered and brought to the surface. The pit is badly blocked with fallen rock, dirt and timbers, and the process of the rescuing party is therefore slow. It is feared that the men who escaped death in the explosion of fire damp will be suffocated by the choke-damp unless speedily rescued.
