THE SWING BRIDGE.—The temporary bridge across the Fenelon river in this village was finished last week, and the trains have passed over it regularly since Monday evening. The work of pulling down the old bridge has already been commenced, and it is thought the whole of it will be removed by the middle of August. A second gang of ten men arrived a few days ago and are living in tents pitched between Maryborough Lodge and the track, and cooking their food in a fireplace built of iron, cement and bricks at the edge of the embankment. Ten carloads of choice stone were recently unloaded on the south bank of the river, others will soon arrive, and two derricks to be used in building the swing bridge have already been erected.

Appalling Scenes at Pomeroy.

Fort Dodge, Ia., July 7.—Pomeroy, a town of 900 inhabitants in Calhoun county, was practically destroyed last evening by a cyclone. Between 50 and 100 persons were killed and nearly 200 injured. Many of the injured will die. The utmost confusion followed the advent of the storm, and it was several hours before the condition of affairs was known. A relief train was sent out as soon as possible over the Illinois Central railroad with physicians, tents and supplies. The town was in a total darkness and the streets were filled with the wreck of homes and business houses. The scenes were appalling, as men with lanterns went about in the debris. In some instances entire families were wiped out; the mangled remains being found in the ruins of their homes. The cries of the injured were heartrending and the general confusion was increased by the wailing of the survivors who were separated from friends or who had relatives in the wreck. The work of rescue was slow and the trainload of help made little headway. The south half of the town was razed. There was no place to care for the injured, and a church which was just outside the path of the storm was turned into an hospital. The surgeons worked here by the aid of lanterns and lamps. Those with broken bones were stretched upon the

pews, while others who needed surgical attention for less severe injuries were compelled to stand or lie upon the floor and await their turn. The dead were laid upon the ground in a vacant lot at the edge of the devastated district. Through the narrow aisles left between the dead bodies the survivors passed, looking for lost ones. In the confusion it was impossible to secure a list of the fatalities.

At Englewood, Star county, Kas., Wm. Waddell, his wife and four children were drowned by a flood while in camp waiting the opening of the Cherokee strip.

The *Belleville-Intelligencer* is printing a list of persons in that neighborhood who are over 80 years of age. Forty-four names were in Saturday's list, those of Irish extraction leading, English next and Scotch third.

A rather curious incident occurred lately in the Mission Church at Couport, Loch Long. Towards the end of the week the church was found to have been invaded by two swarms of bees, which on Sunday successfully held the building against the congregation, who had to betake themselves to the schoolroom, where service was conducted.

Recently the citizens of Newark, S. D., tried their hand at rain making. In the absence of a cannon, two blacksmith's anvils were used. The firing was continued half of the night, and at six o'clock next morning there was a light sprinkling of rain. There had been no rain for nearly three weeks, and as there were no signs of rain before the anvil-beating began, the rain makers take credit for the sprinkling that gladdened them next morning.

A terrible accident occurred in Snyder's mill, 10th con. of Sombra. A boy two and a half years of age, son of Mr. Walter Booth, came to the mill and got playing about the machinery. His clothes caught in the crank of the pump and in an instant he was dashed around two or three times, striking the ground each time. The crank was fastened to a stump outside, and in revolving came within six inches of the ground. When the machinery was stopped and the little fellow released it was found that one arm was broken, his body bruised and his head crushed. Death ended his suffering in two or three minutes.
