Another Pest.

A gentleman just returned from Lake Joseph says that, from present appearance, the hemlocks will be almost annihilated within a few years. Many thousands of them are dead and present a pitiable appearance. Among the islands which have been devastated are Chief, Governor's, Elsinor, Laurie, Clareview, Badgerow, Camerow, and nearly all the islands to the northward. It does not appear that anything can be done to stop the destruction. 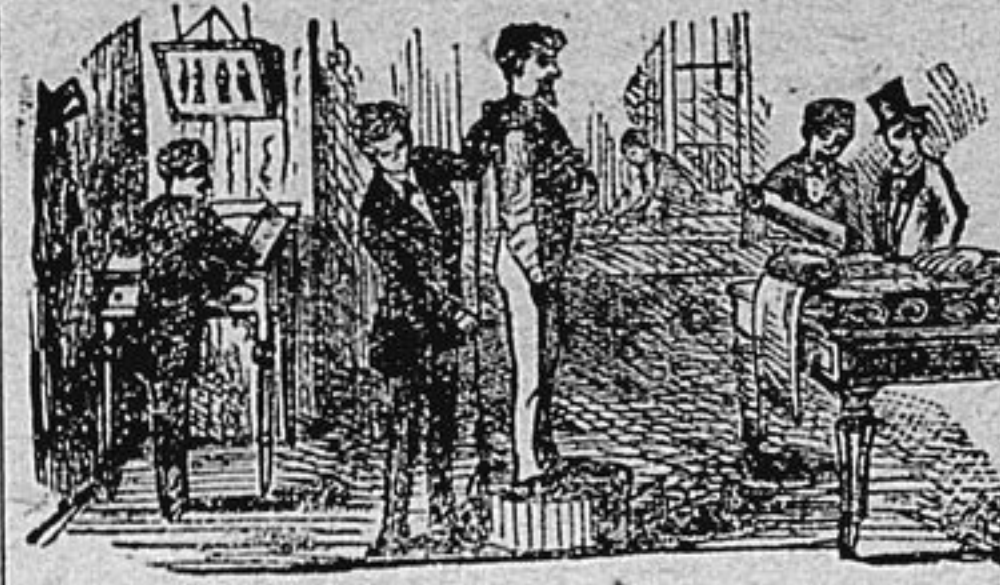
