**'PRENTICE BOYS' DAY**—Whole sheet bills (but not enough of them) have been issued announcing a grand demonstration in Fenelon Falls on Saturday, the 12th inst., in celebration of the 203rd anniversary of the closing of the Gates of Derry. The celebration will be under the management of the True Blues of Maple Leaf Lodge No. 42, Fenelon Falls, assisted by numerous lodges of brethren and sisters from a distance. A representation of the walls and gates of Derry will be erected on the main street, and the gates will be opened in the afternoon by thirteen 'Prentice Boys to allow the procession to pass through. **A REAL ESTATE DEAL**—Mr. John Chambers, Jr., reeve of Fenelon, has purchased the corner lot east of Colborne street and north of Francis street in this village. The property has a frontage of 80 feet by a depth of 108 feet and the price paid was \$1,550. The corner half or more of the lot is vacant, and on the other portion are wooden buildings occupied by Mr. A. McKillop and Mr. Stephen Nevison, the latter of whom will shortly move into the brick store and dwelling he is building on the opposite side of the street. Mr. Chambers had to bargain with Mr. J. W. Fitzgerald of Parry Harbor and Mrs. H. Fowler, each of whom owned part of the land.

**FORESTERS' EXCURSION**—Don't forget the Foresters' excursion to the huckleberry grounds on the shore of Ball Lake on Tuesday next, the 8th inst. The *Crandella* will leave the Falls at 7:30 a. m., sharp, calling at Sturgeon Point, Dunn's Landing and Bobcaygeon, and will remain at the grounds until 4 p. m. As the prospect of obtaining huckleberries, which are very plentiful this season, is offered as an inducement to people to go on the excursion, we hope that the announcement on the posters will be adhered to, and that the start for home will not be made until the hour mentioned. Every person who purchases a ticket has a right to insist that the *Crandella* shall remain at the berrying ground until 4 p. m., and, if she leave earlier, either the captain of the boat or the boss Forester will be guilty of a gross breach of contract.

John Godwin, who conducted a jewelry store at 63½ Queen street west, was found dead on a couch in the rear of his shop on Saturday morning. Godwin had evidently been dead several hours, as the rats had eaten out his right eye and portions of the fingers of his left hand. At the inquest it was found that death was due to perforation of the stomach, caused by the enormous quantity of pickles he had consumed.

The hailstorm in north-western Manitoba last week beat all records. One of the hailstones is alleged to have been driven clean through the clapboard covering of the railway station at Arden, and a machine agent there was struck on the head by several hailstones, and his scalp so badly cut that doctors had to put thirteen stitches in it. Two Indians in the same vicinity were knocked insensible. Fortunately, the storm only extended over a very small area, so that little damage was done to crops.

Wheat harvesting has begun in several parts of Manitoba.

Jane Richardson died in the jail at Kingston on Sunday, aged 110 years.

Some 500 Indians from reservations in Northern Minnesota and Wisconsin have congregated near Shell lake, and trouble is feared.

Ancaster township, south-west of Hamilton, is troubled by an army of tramps, supposed to be from Buffalo. They are heading westward.

Special cable advices to The Globe state that the English supply of apples is thought to be ample to meet the demand there for the early part of the season, and none will be wanted from Canada before well matured winter stock can be shipped.

A well-known grain dealer, who has just returned from a trip west, declares that many fields of wheat in Manitoba and the territories will run forty bushels to the acre. It is the unanimous opinion that this country will certainly produce a phenomenal yield this year.

Three denominations worshipped in the East avenue Baptist church in Long Island City on Sunday, the Roman Catholic, the Methodist and the Baptist. The last was the only one of the three that was in its regular church. The burned-out St. Mary's Roman Catholic congregation held service in the Baptist church. A Methodist flock, owing to the absence of its pastor, joined with the Baptists and Father McGuire celebrated mass.

A special to the *Star* from Pueblo, Col., says: The Arkansas river overflowed its banks on Wednesday night, owing to a cloudburst which emptied tons upon tons of water into the streams. The raging waters undermined foundations, carrying away the buildings. Rescuers manned boats and hastened to the relief of the unfortunates huddled upon roofs and in trees, who were removed to places of greater safety. At least seven lives have been lost.

In Graves county, near Wingo, on Wednesday, a wheat threshing a negro and a white man got into a fight, and the former cut the latter on the hand. The use of the knife enraged the white spectators. They caught the negro and threw him into the threshing machine and killed him. Among the spectators to this horrible affair was a son of the negro, who, to defend his father, picked up a pitch fork and attacked the crowd, sticking the fork into one of the men and killing him. The crowd then turned upon the boy, but he ran and escaped.
