This year's yield of hops in New York state is estimated at 140,000 bales—15,000 more than in 1892.

Letters from the Crimea say that cholera is committing terrible ravages. Hundreds in the province of Taurida are dying daily.

The theory of Jones, the English scientist, is that the earth is a large balloon, and that it will finally collapse as the result of drilling for natural gas.

A despatch from Rome, Ga., says that Chester Scott, the train robber and murderer, escaped from the goal there on Saturday night, with five other prisoners.

A disastrous fire swept over the lumber yards of the Pullman Palace Car Company at Pullman on Monday night, causing damage to the extent of about a quarter of a million dollars.

A lady in California has two farms—one of 10 acres and the other of 12. From the apricots, cherries and vegetables which she raises on these two patches of land she derives an income of \$5,000 a year. Is not that better than clerking for some man at \$7 per week?

A new experiment is being tried in the shipment of a bunch of cattle to Antwerp. The steamship Kent took 400 head for that point from Montreal on Friday last. This is the second shipment ever made to the continent. A shipment to Hamburg two years ago was a failure.

Hon. Edward Blake arrived on the steamship Lake Huron at Quebec at 5 o'clock on Tuesday morning, and left at 8 o'clock to join his family at Murray Bay. Mr. Blake refused to be interviewed regarding English politics, but said that the position of the Liberal party was still unchanged.

The House of Lords threw out the home rule bill last Friday night by a vote of 419 to 41. The attendance of peers was the largest in many years, and there were twenty-two bishops present, all of whom went against the bill; but the Lords will have to pass it, sooner or later, or run a great risk of being thrown out themselves.

In New York city, on the night of the 7th inst., Mrs. Josephine Lindner, a widow 46 years old, was run against by a horse and sulky that a boy was driving recklessly, and a shaft of the vehicle penetrated her breast, breaking three ribs, passing through her left lung and out at her back. She was dragged a considerable distance before the horrified spectators could stop the horse, and when disengaged from her terrible position she was found to be dead.

A prominent legal journal of London makes the startling proposition that the wig be abolished as part of the English judicial system. "Its abomination in every sense, practical and ornamental, is admitted," says the journal. "It is a relic of by-gone age, and spoils the looks of most men with any pretensions to beauty, while ugly men it makes grotesque. It probably conduces to somnolence."

The *Mirror and Farmer* tells of a Maine sea captain who gave his little son a \$65 Jersey cow, and agreed to keep her in exchange for milk. The son milked and his mother looked after the dairy. The first year the mother and son paid rent for pasture and divided \$109 between them, and the second year divided \$89 and had a fine calf to dispose of. It won't be hard to persuade that boy to stay on the farm.
