Use of a Marble as a Monument Over a Grave.

One of the curiosities of West Linton, Peebleshire, Scotland, consisted in a marble tombstone in the parish churchyard over the grave of James Oswald of Spittal, a property among the Pentlands hills, now included in the estate of Newhall.
