

**THE STONE MILL.**—Messrs. At present only two runs of stones will be put in, one for chopping and the other for grinding coarse grains, but in the near future the building, which is a very large one, will be filled with the rolls, &c., used in producing first class flour by the latest and most improved process.

**MONEY WANTED.**—Two or three weeks ago we mailed a number of accounts to subscribers who are in arrears for the *Gazette*. but, so far, none of them have sent the amounts they owe. **FROM MANITOBA.**—Mr. John Wesley Junkin and his cousin, Mr. Wm. A. Devitt, two Verulam young men, returned the other day from Boissevain, Southern Manitoba, where they spent seven weeks, part of which time they were engaged at farm work, the wages being \$35 a month for thrashing and \$40 a month during harvest. Owing to the dryness of the season, the grain crop was the poorest for several years, wheat and oats only averaging about twelve bushels to the acre; but roots and vegetables were fair, and there was plenty of prairie hay, the only kind used. They liked the country very well, the soil being excellent, but high winds are far too prevalent. There, as in Ontario, some of the farmers are making money, while others have enough to do to keep their heads above water.

The Government grain inspector's report, just published at Winnipeg, shows that over 60 per cent. of the wheat crop of Manitoba thus far inspected has graded number one or better.

The farmer of the future will be a woman if Michigan affords a basis for prophecy. In Wayne county alone there are 220 women farmers, and in the whole State 8,707, with an ownership of 670,436 acres. The value of the land is estimated at \$43,500,000, and the earnings of the women aggregate \$4,324,500.

Mrs. Sydney, of 764 Markham street, Toronto, became the happy mother of triplets on Friday last. The babies are five healthy little ones, two boys and one girl. Mrs. Sydney is now entitled to what is known as the "Queen's bounty," that is, if her Majesty considers her subjects in Canada entitled to enjoy the same privileges as the mothers of triplets in the British Isles. The British sovereign's custom of sending £5 to the mother of triplets is not a written law, but it is as firmly established as the British constitution.

The newest thing in journalism is a farthing newspaper which will be published soon in Paris by a well-known Anarchist, who is now free after eighteen months' imprisonment. It will be named *La Vie*, and will be of diminutive size, and will be sold at two centimes—say a farthing. It will be printed on whitey-brown paper, but every second day there will be issued an edition on white paper at a halfpenny. With this superior copy the purchaser can buy the next day the farthing issue, so that he still pays only a farthing per diem.
