

The Physical Strain Involved in High Speeds.

The exacting that modern railroad speed makes on the physical stamina of railroad men is demonstrated in the fact that seven engineers are required to take the Chicago flier out and seven to bring it back, says the *Boston Transcript*. The running time between New York and Chicago is twenty hours, and the average speed is forty-eight miles an hour. Each engineer and engine runs three hours. Machine and man return with a slow train to their starting point to relieve the strain on both. Then the engineer is given forty hours' rest before he goes on the flier again. This rest is absolute, no work of any kind being required of the engineer. Though the average speed is forty-eight miles an hour, the locomotive must at some points be driven at sixty or more. The physical strain of the men in the cab at those bursts of speed is something terrible. The engineer is being shaken and swayed all the time. The fireman is constantly feeding the insatiable furnace. On the run of the Empire State express three tons of coal are shovelled from the tender into the furnace between New York and Albany. It is not wonderful that the engineers of this train are given alternate days for recuperation. Fast travel not only wears out rails and machines, but human creatures lives.

To Patronize Corbett.

OTTAWA, Nov. 18.—The refusal of Lord Aberdeen to extend his patronage to "La Mascotte" continues to arouse much unfavourable comment in certain quarters, while on the other hand the Governor-General is receiving credit for the stand he has taken.

An idea of the extent to which the practice is carried of seeking the patronage of the Governor-General may be formed from the fact that, when Jim Corbett's troupe was here, application was made to Lord Stanley to allow the performance to be carried on under his patronage.

The other day a gentleman who was putting up a row of buildings in this city wrote to Lord Aberdeen asking his permission to name the block after him, while a cigar maker asked his Excellency to favor him by allowing him to put a new brand of cigars into the market as "The Aberdeens." I am informed that hardly a day passes that similar requests are not received at the Government House, until it has become an intolerable nuisance.

After the Anarchists.

MADRID, Nov. 18.—The procurator fiscal of the Supreme Court has issued a circular addressed to all the judges in Spain directing them to deal severely with all teachers of anarchy where they conduct their propaganda in newspapers or elsewhere. Owing to the explosion at the Lyceum theatre at Barcelona, 13 arrests of anarchists have been made in that city. Documents were found upon two of the prisoners.

PARIS, Nov. 18.—Acting upon the initiative of Spain, the European Governments have agreed to keep very close watch upon anarchists. The police of each country will arrest foreign anarchists and send them back to their own countries.

M. Dupuy, Prime Minister and Minister of the Interior, has ordered the enforcement of drastic regulations against anarchists here and elsewhere in France. The police everywhere make frequent visits to houses known or suspected to be occupied by anarchists.

A Strange Habitation.

LONDON, Ont., Nov. 18.—The county authorities are considerably puzzled what to do in the case of John Brazil, a man arrested while living in a hollow log out in Lobo. Brazil is his native country, not his name, and the poor fellow does not appear to be crazy. He was in Chicago and gave his money to a policeman there to buy him a ticket to California, where his friends are. The policeman kept all his money and handed his ticket a Grand Trunk World's Fair Ticket from Bealville to Chicago and return. When he got back as far as Komoka he got off, and as long as his little remnant of money lasted he bought food and lived in the fields. In his pocket book was found a strip of paper bearing the name of Joseph Nelson. An effort will be made to have him admitted to the poor house.

Mr. R. Bickerdike, of the Dominion Live Stock Exchange, reports 590 cattle and 1 286 sheep exported from Montreal last week.

A small safe, containing \$7,500 and belonging to the United States Express Company, was stolen at the Big Four Depot at Troy, O., on Friday.

The Richmond, Que., post-office was robbed of about \$1,000 in cash and stamps on Saturday night. Dynamite was used to break the safe. No clue.

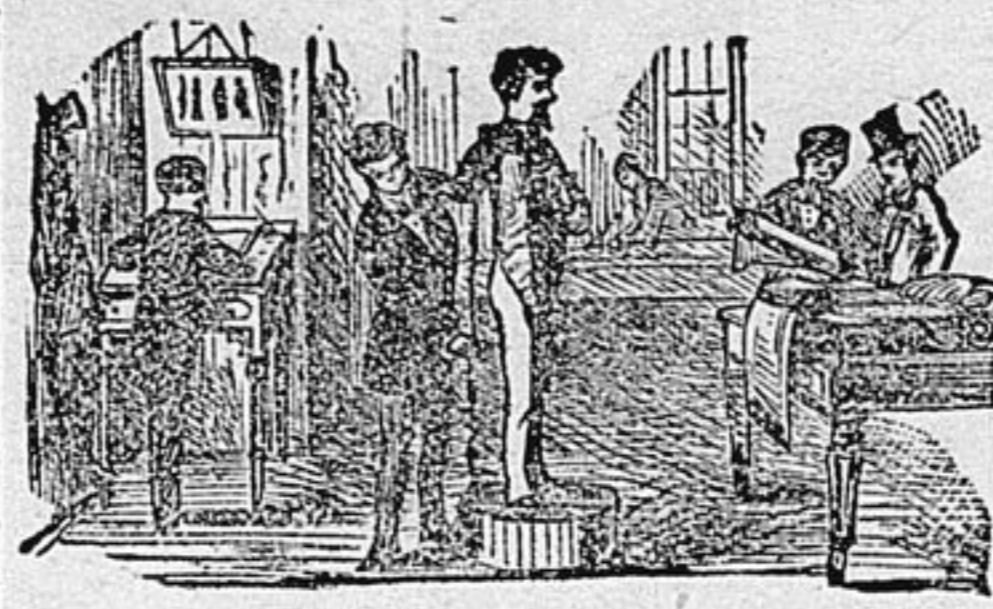
