During the time he had them he fed them 700 pounds of shorts, costing \$6.50; 400 pounds of peas and oats, \$3 60; and 5 bushels of peas, \$2.50; in all they cost \$16.60, being a fraction less than 31 cents per pound. The pigs were not quite 8 months old when killed. We think this is cheap pork, and it certainly was good pork; the pigs were penned up all the time he had them, and if they had got a run in a clover field during part of the summer they would have cost less still. This shows that farmers can make money by raising hogs."
