The War Cloud

WHICH MANY PEOPLE THINK IS HANG-
ING OVER EUROPE AND ASIA.

NEW YORK, Dec. 10.—The Sun's
London correspondent says: The time
has come to describe the prevailing
naval panic in England as a genuine
war scare. A fear amounting to con-
viction has seized certain Englishmen
who believe the coming spring will see
Great Britain at war with one or more
great powers. The sources of informa-
tion and the judgment of some of these
persons entitle their opinions to respect.
They include some prominent members
of the Conservative party and the ed-
itors of certain leading newspapers.
Some slight weakness in consols this
week suggests that the impression
may be spreading to financial circles.
Whether these sinister forebodings are
based solely upon facts and reasons
known of all men it is impossible to say.
Some ground for apprehension must
exist when the Conservatism of English
journalism is so far overcome as to lead
the management of at least one great
London daily to undertake extensive
preparations for a European war in the
coming spring. More than one editorial
office on Fleet street is getting ready for
a campaign. No editor has yet been
foolish enough to express his fears in
print. They confine themselves, espe-
cially the Tory journals, to describing in
the gloomiest language the dangers
which would impend if war should find
England unprepared. The situation in
the newspaper world proves, at least,
the sincerity of the alarmist Tory press
in promoting a naval panic. This agi-
tation and probably other causes have
already had an important effect. The

Government has denied that a few days
ago it placed a large loan for naval
construction purposes, but it has not
denied the report that orders have been
sent this week to five naval dockyards
for the beginning of work immediately
on four first-class battleships and one
first-class cruiser. There is, of course,
no thought of Great Britain being the
aggressor in the apprehended quarrel.
The prophets of war profess to believe
that Russia and France will take ad-
vantage of any provocation to draw the
sword against England, and will seek
to crush her by a series of sudden blows
before Germany or the Triple Alliance
can find an excuse for joining in the
melee. They say that in spite of Eng-
land's professions of neutrality, both
France and Russia are convinced that
she will on some pretext go to Germany's
assistance when the inevitable continen-
tal war breaks out. Therefore the new
allies argue they might as well deal
with England first and alone if possible.
It is further argued that the whole ten-
dency of the French-Russian policy of
the past six months has been clearly
anti-English, and that only hostile in-
tentions can logically be ascribed to
those countries. These reasons and
arguments are all that are advanced in
support of the war theory. These are,
of course, inadequate, but if any others
exist they are well guarded. Not a day
passed this week without its fresh war
rumors. Most of them were denied
almost as soon as printed. Others are
not worth denying. It has been France
against Italy, Russia against Turkey,
Russia in the East, and France and
Russia against everybody in general.

**Dairymen's Association of Eastern
Ontario.**

The annual meeting of convention
of the above association will be held in
the town of Peterborough, Ont., on Wed-
nesday and Thursday, January 3rd and
4th, 1894. Prof. J. P. Roberts, of Cor-
nell University, Ithaca, N. Y., who has
charge of the agricultural farm there;
Ex-Governor Hoard, of Fort Atkinson,
Wisconsin, U. S., both of whom have
had large and valuable experience in
all matters pertaining to the dairy, in
feeding and producing milk, will deliver
addresses specially prepared for farmers
and dairymen. Prof. Roberts, of the
dairy department, experimental farm,
Ottawa, who is an authority on butter and
cheese, will also give his experience at
the World's Fair, and experiments in
the dairy department, as well as valuable
hints and suggestions to cheese makers,
dairymen and farmers. Mr. F. T.
Shutt, chief chemist of the experimental
farm of Ottawa, who has been doing
some very valuable work in the analysis
of fodder corn and milk, will make the
same known at our convention, showing
the value of fodder corn, if grown and
harvested in the proper time and man-
ner. The Minister of Agriculture for
the Province of Ontario, Hon. John
Dryden, and one or two of the professors
from the model farm at Guelph, and
others, are also expected to be present
and address the members of the associa-
tion. Ample time will be given for the
asking of questions and the discussing
of all subjects, including silos, construc-
tion of silos, feeding of ensilage, and every-
thing pertaining to the best interests of
the farmers and dairymen.
Reduced railway fares to all attending
the convention secured by obtaining a
certificate from the ticket agent at the
starting point, and getting the same
certified to by the secretary at the con-
vention. Be sure and ask for certificate
when purchasing your ticket of railway
ticket agent at starting point over each
line of railway, or no reduced fare will
be allowed on return passage. The re-
duced fare is only allowed on the return
passage, and only obtainable on your
getting certificate from ticket agent at
starting point, and then certified to by
the secretary of the association at the
convention. Ample space will be pro-
vided to exhibit dairy utensils.
