The Suspected Murderer Caught.

William Walter McWhirrell, alias Maguire, who is accused of the atrocious murder of old James and Elizabeth Williams of the Middle road on Friday, December 15th, has at last been run to

Inconceivable as it may appear, he was captured but twelve short miles from police headquarters, in a district where he was well known and where for days he mingled with his friends, and went about the duties of life as unconcernedly as if two staffs of detectives in Toronto and every policeman in the country were not on the lookout for him. It was in the dead of Tuesday night, and while he slept in the house of Henry Stableford, a Scarboro' farmer, his former employer, that he was taken. He submitted quietly to the arrest, but stoutly protested his innocence of the awful crime which a tell-tale trail of circumstances has apparently laid at his door.

One word of caution should be added. The detectives should not rest satisfied with the assumption that McWhirrell committed the double murder of the Middle road. There are some facts which render that hypothesis improbable. It is scarcely credible that a sane man would be concerning himself for three days in the sale of a horse and vehicle which he knew to be the proceeds of a murder about which the whole Province was talking and speculating. Such recklessness is unnatural, and should suggest caution in rushing to the conclusion that the author of the murders is in the hands of the police. The task of the detectives is not yet finished. -Globe.
