The Richest Woman in America.

NEW YORK, February 2 -- Mrs. Hetty Green, celebrated as one of the most eccentric as well as the richest woman in America, has again negotiated one of her lightning-like disappearances. She occupied a third story rear hall room in a boarding house in Brooklyn, five days ago. She paid \$7 a week for the room, and is said to have eaten her meals in the kitchen. Her residence at this writing is unknown. She became alarmed in the early part of last week over the fact that her living place had been discovered. That was enough for Hetty Green. She packed her few belongings, paid her reckoning and was off before Landlady Bonta could utter a remonstrance. She did not leave her future address. Mrs. Green has therefore sunk as completely out of sight, so far as the curious public is concerned, as if she had never cast the lustre of her riches and unique personality around the fas-

Various reasons are assigned for Mrs. Green's renunciation of the quietude of Brooklyn. The most commonplace is that the wealthy lady has never been known to remain long in one place. In support of this theory it is argued that the chief concern has always been to keep her residence a secret from even her near relatives, and that in order to preserve such secrecy frequent changes of domicile were necessary. As far as could be ascertained Mrs. Greene had resided with Mrs. Bonta for a little more than a month, which period, it is asserted, was beyond her accustomed limit of quiescence. It was therefore, it is claimed, high time to be up and moving. It is also stated that she recently received threatening letters, and that she feared abduction.
