I don't wish to tax your time and space, Mr. Editor, but I wish to say a few words for the benefit of farmers and others who haven't had experience in dehorning calves with caustic potash. Use it in sticks wrapped in tough paper to protect the hands. Moisten the end of the stick with a sponge and apply it to a space about the size of a silver quarter dollar, taking the point of the young horn for a centre, and avoid touching other parts. Have some vinegar on hand to apply at once if the potash touches any other part. The best time to use it is when the young horn can first be felt, when the animal is about two weeks old.






