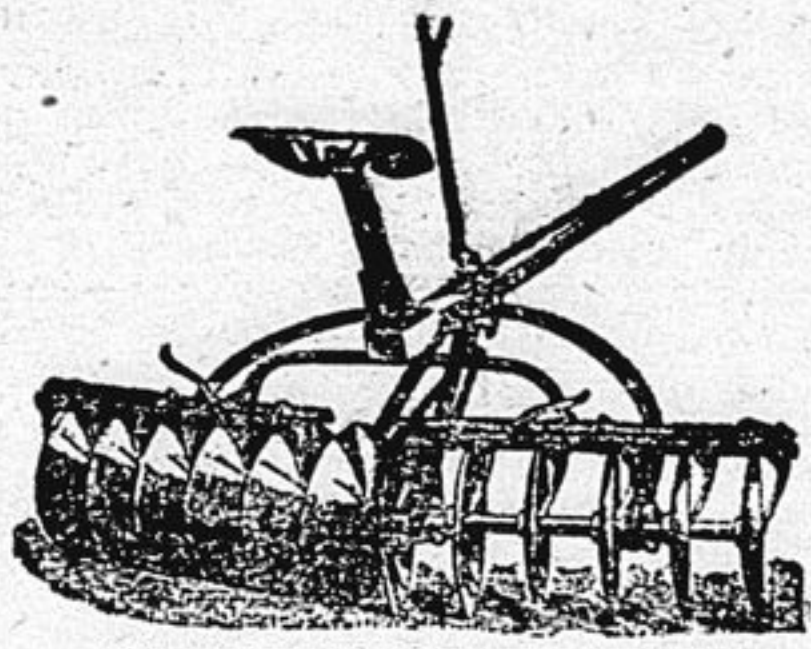

Mrs. Mitchell Ferron has been on the sick list, but is now improving a little.

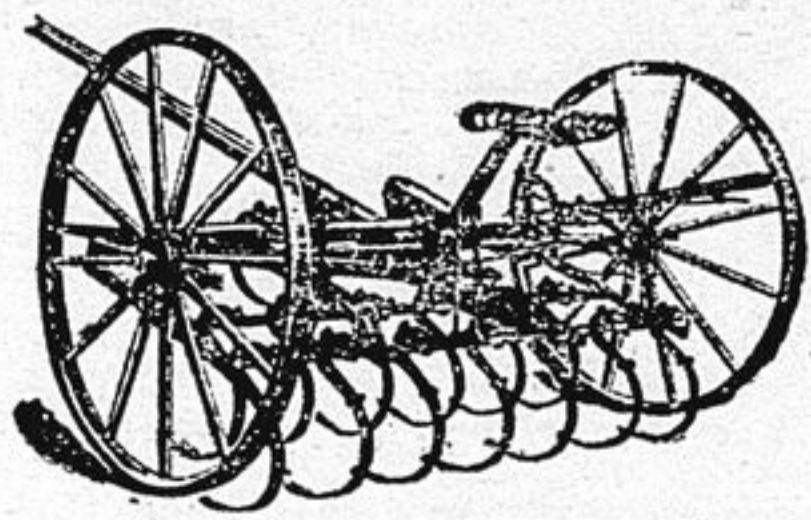

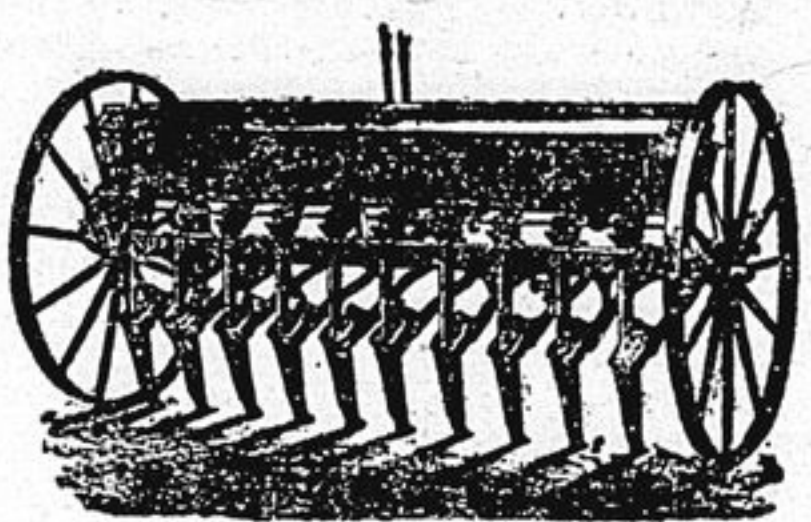

ACCIDENT.—On Monday, the 9th inst., Mr. Wm Adkins Jr, of Burnt River, fell while loading cordwood on to a car and dislocated the left shoulder joint. After futile attempts by his companions to replace it, he was brought to Fenelon Falls to Dr. Wilson, who administered chloroform and reduced the dislocation.

THE "DAWN"—Mr. John A. Ellis's steamer Dawn is undergoing repairs in the upper lock, where she spent the winter. Last year her hull was rebuilt and now she is getting a new deck; in fact, she will soon be all new except her name and her machinery. The work on her was commenced last Monday, and Mr. Ellis says that it will be finished some time next week.

A NEW STEAMER.—During the past winter Mr. Peter Grant of Bobcaygeon has been busy building a new steamer for Mr. William Burgoyne of this village, and as soon as navigation opens she will be towed up to the Falls and have her machinery put in. Her measurements are, keel, 45 feet; beam, 9 feet, and it is estimated that she will easily run thirteen miles an hour. Her boiler and engine were made by Mr. H. W. Petrie of Toronto. The boiler, which weighs over 3,800 lbs., is already here, and the will engine arrive by the time she will be ready for it. Mr. Burgoyne's old boat, the *Nonna Roy*, has had all her machinery taken out, and will probably be converted into a "palace scow."

ARRIVED.—A 15-ton carload of machinery arrived at the Falls from the Canadian General Electric Co.'s works, Peterboro', last Saturday afternoon, preparations for unloading it were made on Monday, and on Tuesday the first article—the foundation of what is called an "exciter"—was carefully lowered down an inclined plane to the floor of the power-house, and shifted by means of crow-bars to the position it was to occupy. As far as we could learn, the car contained the exciter and part of a gigantic motor, the rest of which was to arrive by the time the men would be ready for it. There is room in the house for two motors, only one of which will be put in at present; but one exciter will do for both of them. It is expected that the first consignment of electricity will be sent to Lindsay by about the 1st of May.
