Famine in India.

Yes, there is a famine in India. The number of people who are starving there is greater than the entire population of Canada.

Yet India produces enough for all. She exported more goods in 1896 than she imported by \$111,250,690; and the amount now is placed at \$150,000,000 per year.

Nearly all this amount goes to Great Britain, whose imports in 1896 exceeded her exports by \$535,252,000; and the story of one year is the story of every year, with variations.

Send produce to India! Why, when India produces more than she needs? Send money to India! That is what capitalists desire, for a market at home is preferable to a market abroad.

Help the sufferers! Yes! But how? Relieve their wants and save their lives; that is charity, which all should practice. But the man who is charitable and not just is not blameless.

Wherein, then, lies justice? The Secretary for India the other day in the British House of Commons admitted the famine to be the worst in the century, and a motion was made to enquire into the causes of the famine and the means to prevent similar outbreaks in the future.

If famines are only "visitations from God," what has the the British House of Commons to do with an Indian famine? Nonsense! The motion introduced means Applied Christianity if an investigation is really made, and an honest report presented and acted upon.

What can the Commons do? This question is answered by a sentence in an editorial in the London Labour Leader. It says: "What adds to the horror of the situation is that these famines are all due to preventable causes, for the continuance of which the Government is directly responsible."

A penny a day will maintain a human being in India, so it is said. Soup will do the same thing in Canada—but let that pass. Give the perishing men and women and babies your pennies, and lots of them; but along with your pennies send a message to the bondholders in India and Britain whose extortionate demands have pauperized the natives as they never were pauperized when they were called a barbarous people.—*Citizen and Country.*

An Enemy to Society.

Three facts about the Standard Oil Company have lately been published:

1. It controls the output in Canada.
2. The company has just declared a twenty per cent. quarterly dividend.
3. The G. T. R. and the C. P. R. are giving preferential rates to the Standard, as revealed in Parliament.

As the Standard controls the oil trade on both sides of the line, it makes little difference in the price whether the present duty is lowered or not. The ultimate regulation of prices is in the hands of the company. In view of the highway robbery of a monopoly which declares such a quarterly dividend, and in view of the fact that a foreign enemy is playing the game in Canada that has been so successfully carried out in the United States, why cannot the people of Canada rebel against such exorbitance, and through its Government make its oil wells a subject of "public ownership?" Such an enemy to society as that company should not have a too generous consideration in the way of compensation, in the face of its millions already squeezed from the public. I write this in the same spirit in which I seek to preach the Gospel of our Lord. To have religious freedom and intellectual and political emancipation is not enough, we must have no pecuniary and material bondage.—*L. M. England, Georgeville, Que.*

The Turkish torpedo boat Schamyl blew up in Bayrout harbor, resulting in the loss of 23 lives.

Chinese opposition to the "open-door" policy is growing and endangering foreign capital and the lives of foreigners.

The three men under arrest and charged with attempting to destroy the locks on the Welland Canal were remanded.

The extreme penalty, \$50 and costs or six months in jail under the by-law, was imposed on the five young men who took part in the disturbances at the Jewish Synagogue at Ottawa on Sunday, April 15.
