




 A PERILOUS FEAT.—When the flag-stag, eighty-two feet high, was erected near the lock-master's office three or four years ago, it was provided with a rope with which to haul up a flag when any day or event was to be celebrated; but, from exposure to rain and continual thrashing against the flagstaff, the rope wore out and broke. As it was necessary to have a new one before the Queen's birthday, Mr. Robert Caecell was employed to put it up, which he did on Tuesday last. He made his first attempt on Monday, but, owing to the high wind and something being wrong with the pulley at the top, he deferred the perilous feat until next day, when it was performed in a short time. As the flagstaff is very slender, the wind on Monday caused it to sway fearfully, and many of the persons who were watching Mr. Caecell mentioned various large sums of money that it would take to tempt them to make the ascent.
