"War Against War."

A REVIEW OF THE HISTORICAL AND
SOCIOLOGICAL PUBLICATION OF
W. T. STEAD.

The cause of progress and humanity
is under many obligations to W. J.
Stead, whose pen has done effective
service in connection with many advanced
movements; but he has never under-
taken a nobler or a more needed work
than that in which he is at present en-
gaged in exposing the utterly unjustifi-
able character of the war of spoliation
which the Tory Government of Britain
has waged against the brave little South
African Republics. At a time when
the passions of men are influenced to
madness and the voice of reason is un-
able to make itself heard, it requires no
little courage on the part of a publicist
whose future depends upon public favor
to cast in his lot with the "saving re-
nant" and stand boldly for the truth.
This service Mr. Stead is now doing for
the English-speaking world by the pub-
lication of his weekly journal, "War
Against War in South Africa," in which
an honest endeavor is made to set forth
the facts of the case and to expose the
real aims and motives of the party now
unfortunately in the ascendancy in
Britain. The British people and those
who obtain their information from Brit-
ish sources have been systematically
duped and hoodwinked by a venal press,
either directly controlled by the cap-
italists who are personally interested in
the gold mines of the Transvaal, or pur-
chased by the means at their command.
The most glaring falsehoods have been
published as to the causes of the war,
and a conspiracy of silence is main-
tained as to the ruthless manner in which
it has been waged. A constant stream
of abuse and vilification is being pour-
ed forth against the Boers, and, in short,
all the means known to the most un-
scrupulous and astute manipulators of
public opinion in the world, backed by
unlimited means, are being employed to
suppress the truth and glorify whole-
sale rapine and piracy. We in Canada
are so besotted by our unreasoning and
servile devotion to everything English,
that we are prone to take our opinions
at second hand from the prostituted
Cockney press, without stopping to re-
flect that there is a nobler and better
England which has not been carried off
its feet by the blood-drunk frenzy of
the day, and which condemns the vil-
lainies now being perpetrated in the
name of patriotism just as sternly and
unsparingly as does the contemporary
judgment of the outside world. It is
pleasing to note that while many men
of whom better things might have been
expected have bowed like reeds before
the storm, the Socialists and the
great majority of the labor reformers
of England have remained true to their
principles. Mr. Stead's publication has
done splendid work in spreading the
light, and it is only to be regretted that
it has not had a wider circulation in
this country. It is a veritable mine of
information, recording all the passing
phases of the war and many notable
utterances of the question from various
sources. The cartoons republished from
Continental and other newspapers are
particularly interesting, as showing
what onlookers think of the situation.
Every Socialist and Labor Reformer
should obtain the bound copies for the

months of December, January and Feb-
ruary. There is no question of more
vital concern to the masses of the peo-
ple everywhere, who as yet do not fully
realize that in encouraging militarism
they are simply cutting a rod for their
own backs, and that the "brave fel-
lows" who are now shooting Boers in
South Africa may soon be commanded
to shoot down striking workmen in
Canada—as has been done time and
again in the States. This is capitalistic
war, and as such should meet with the
opposition of labor everywhere, and all
those who wish to oppose it intelligently
will find a storehouse of facts and argu-
ments in "War Against War."

Stealing With a Long Head.

Ruskin says: "It is as much a theft
to steal with a long head as with a long
arm." He says that the remark that
"a man may do what he pleases with
his own money" is equivalent to saying
"If a man's powder and shot are his
own, he may shoot where he pleases."

The great capitalists, with rare ex-
ceptions, secure their millions by the
"long headed and long armed methods."
Who dug the precious metals from the
earth, tilled the soil, quarried the rock,
made the brick, built the ships and
houses, and canals, and railroads—in
short, who has done the work of the
world and brought the luxuries we now
have? Was it the Vanderbilts, the
Astors, the Rockefellers, the Carnegies,
or men of their class? No, no! Their
heads and elongated arms laid plain
through which they harvested big crops
where they had not sown.

Are they thieves, as intimated by
Ruskin? Well, not in the ordinary
sense, not as the average man looks
upon business methods now. And yet
they are in possession of millions of
wealth they never earned. They are
enabled to secure it by reason of a false
and very defective system of business.
Are those millions in the coffers of the
monopolists their money, to do with as
they please? Yes, legally; no, from a
high moral point of view. When the
long headed and long armed monopolist
tells the working-man that the millions
he has secured by the tricks of trade
are his property—he "made" those
millions—and the working-men and
Socialists who suggest some more
orderly and fair business methods are
"lazy, shiftless fellows wanting to di-
vide," then he gets the truth wrong end
foremost. He, himself, is a cunning
idler, the selfish schemer, the very fel-
low who has been "dividing up" with
the creator of wealth, and in the division
he has taken from the honest toiler
about nine times more than he should
have taken. Does he justify this action
on the ground that he is longer headed
than his brother man? Reader, if
you had two sons and one had a "longer
head" than the other, would you justify
the brighter boy in robbing the weaker
brother?

What Socialism is Not.

Socialism is not a mere "doctrine"
or metaphysical cult, to be toyed with
for a time and then dropped, on the
emergency of some more novel or more
fascinating speculation. It is the in-
evitability of the Co-operative Com-
monwealth which is its chief feature.
Sir William Harcourt spoke far more
wisely than he knew, when he jestingly
declared: "We are all Socialists now."
The reprobated "Millionaire" and the
conscienceless "Trust" are, in truth,
the most potent factors of Socialism.
They are the living evidence of theo-
retical truths which but for them would
be without tangible support. Socialism,
above all things, teaches that each age
grows out of that which precedes it, in
obedience to rigid laws of social devel-
opment, and that progress is impossible
except in harmony with these laws.
Such is the testimony, conscious or un-
conscious, of every historian worthy of
the name.—J. Morrison Davidson, au-
