Harris, fixing bridge on his beat, 50c; J. E. Fittal, salary as collector, \$70.—Carried.

Moved by Mr. Palmer, seconded by Mr. Dewel, That this council now adjourn to meet at Cambray at the call of the reeve.—Carried.

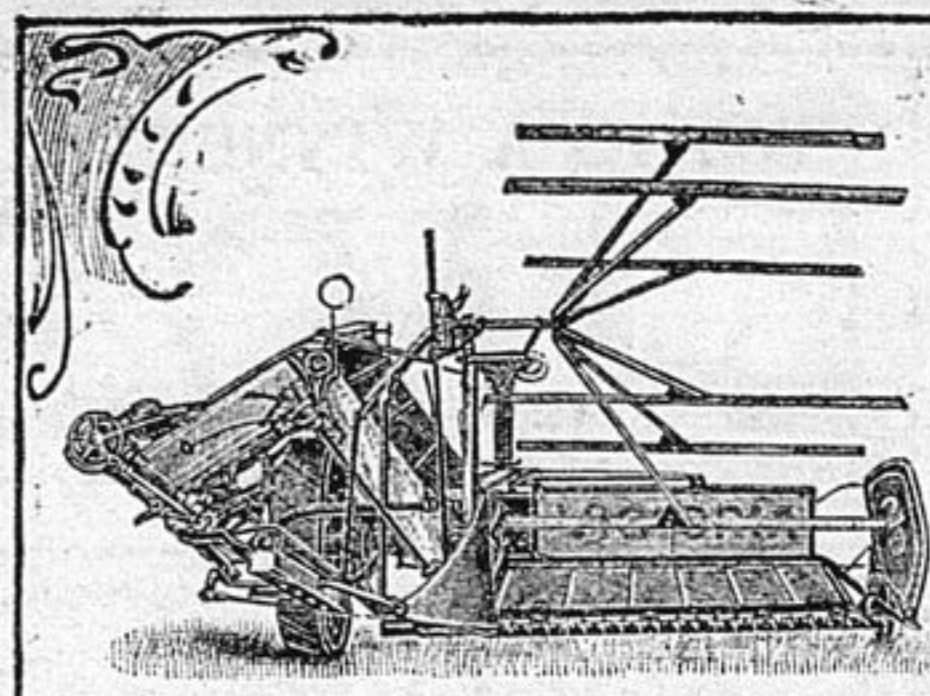

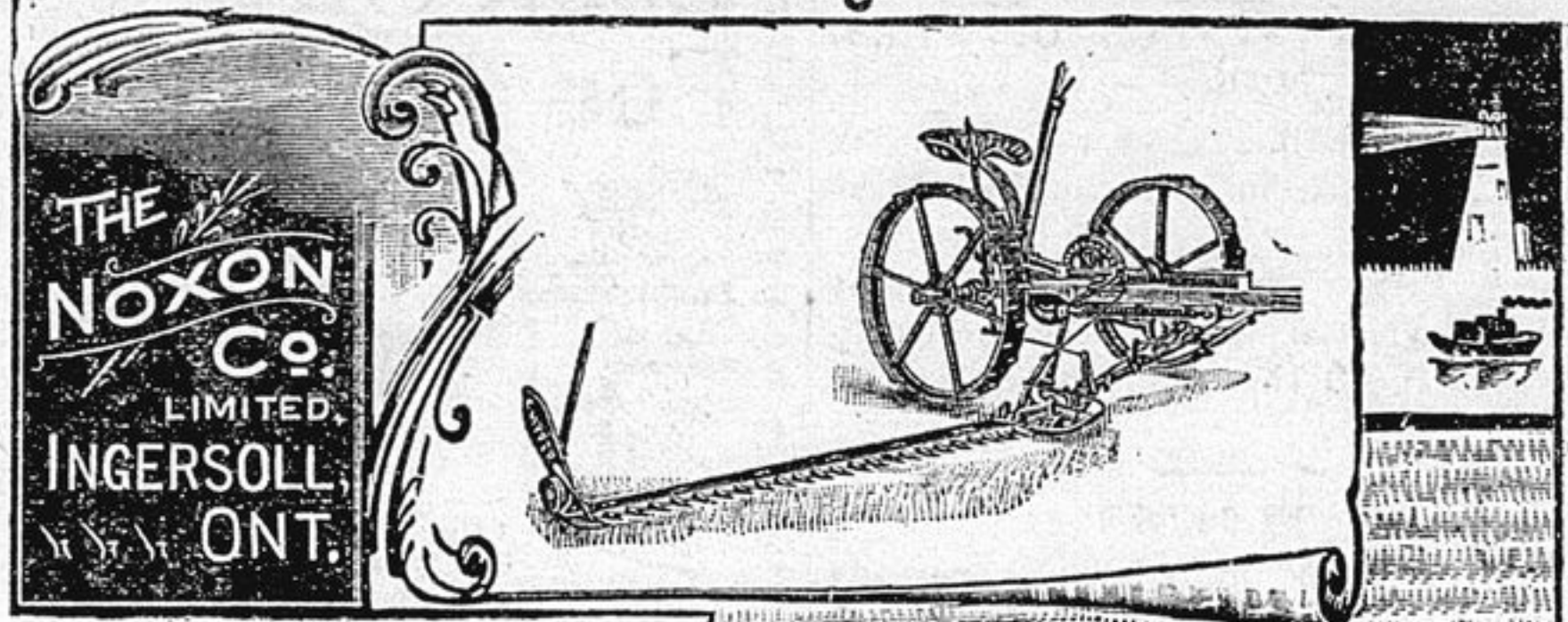

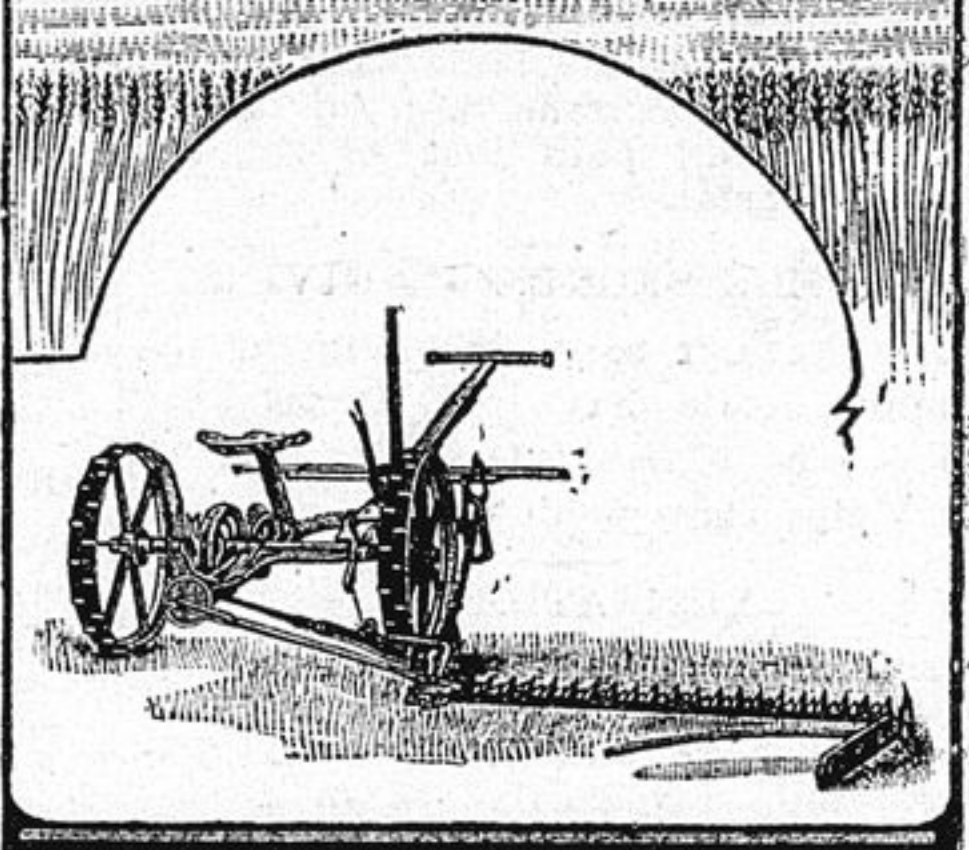
