

We have several times inveighed against the log nuisance, and are pleased to know that it is to be minimized, if not entirely done away with, by an arrangement of piers and booms at which men are now working near the mouth of the river.


ON HIS VOYAGE.—On Monday last we received the following fine lines on a post-card from Rev. Mr. Leitch:—"We have had a delightful run and are nearing Quebec. The tidy French villages with their nicely whitened habitations, are in pleasing contrast with nature's universal green. The *Tunisian* is a huge palatial steamer, 525 x 63 feet, with five decks and hold, and drawing 30 feet of water. They say we have 800 or more on board. There has been no ship motion or vibration from machinery. Our company is very friendly. Most of the passengers are American tourists, for the most part going to the Exhibition at Paris, but about 30 are taking the European trip." We join with the reverend gentleman's other friends in wishing him a pleasant and profitable "outing" and a safe return home.

WINDY.—During Friday last a strong north-west wind blew almost continuously, and on Saturday it was nearly as bad. A farmer whose land runs to the shore of Sturgeon lake says that he never saw the lake in such a rage as it was in on Friday, and that the wind stripped nearly all the trees in his orchard of their fruit, besides breaking some of the branches, and ruined his tomatoes. The waves were so high that they invaded the deck and hold of the *Maple Leaf*, actually putting out the fire, but she managed to make her way to Sturgeon Point, where she remained all night. Mr. Robson's staunch little new steamer the *Doughtless* undertook to tow a scow to Lindsay, but was forced to abandon it after a long and brave struggle with the nor'-wester, somewhere in the Scouge river, and go back for it after the wind went down. In the forenoon a boom of Boyd & Co's broke in Cameron lake and the canal was soon jammed full of logs, which had

to be let, a few at a time, through the locks into the river below the falls. 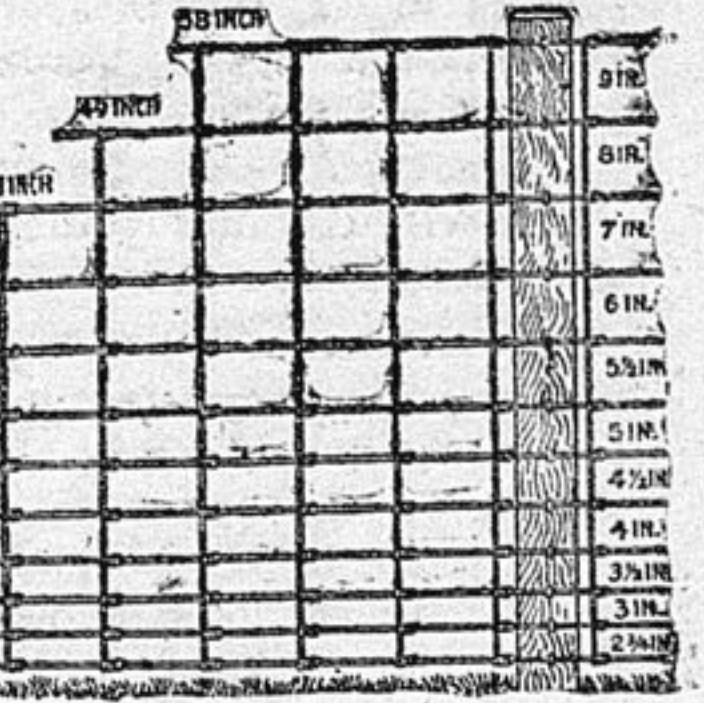


