We copy the following from the Farm  
 Journal, published in Philadelphia:  
 "A great many farmers never notice  
 the birds, or, if they do, look upon them  
 as a pest during the fruit season; yet  
 the birds are constantly giving the farm-  
 ers aid in destroying the larvae of in-  
 sects and the insects themselves. Take  
 the robin, for instance. He is given  
 credit for being a great destroyer of  
 fruit, cherries in particular, but that is  
 only a portion of his diet for a short  
 time each year. The rest of the season  
 he is constantly destroying insects, some  
 of which would work great injury to  
 the crops. No sooner does he arrive  
 from the south than he begins his on-  
 slaught upon them. The larvae of two  
 hundred insects of a destructive class  
 have been taken from the stomach of a  
 robin. He is especially fond of the cut  
 worm. Raising two or three broods a  
 year, he has to supply plenty of food to  
 the young, and the cut worm, with the  
 other pests, suffers in consequence. Out  
 of the greater number of birds, few take  
 fruit, and these should not be killed,  
 because of the greater good they do.  
 The farmer ought to consider the fruit  
 they take as a payment for their aid to  
 him. Have they not earned it?"

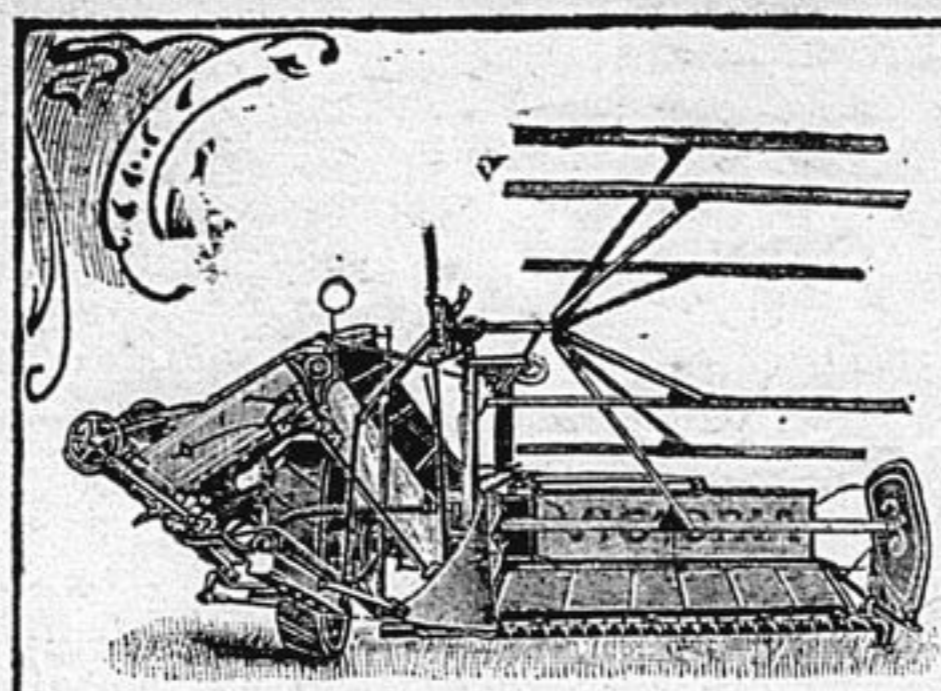
**KILLED BY LIGHTNING.**—A valuable

 "estimated" at about 8½ pounds.

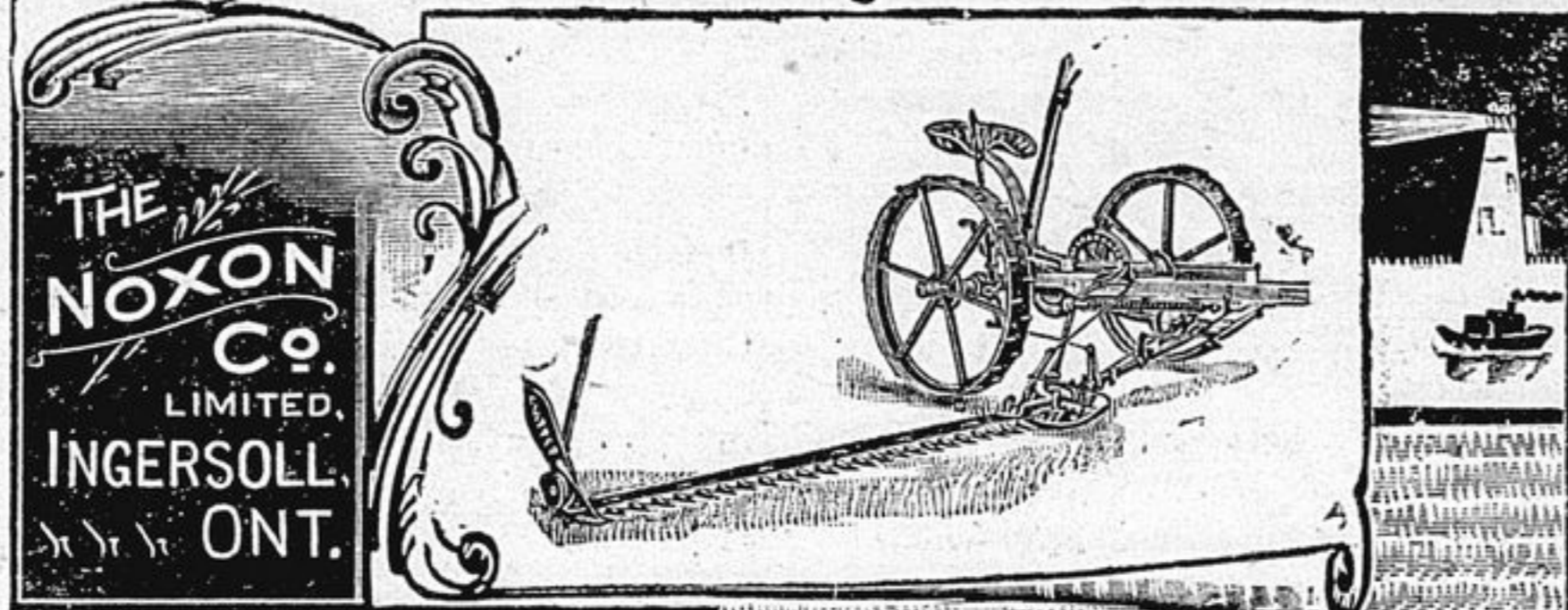
