**GRAVEL.**—Mr. Jackett is putting a coat of gravel on the main street, and the pants of his horses show that he is drawing pretty fair loads. The gravel is from the pit purchased recently by the corporation from Mr. J. J. Nevison, and is packing well, though at first it was thought by many who saw it to contain too much sand. **MILL ACCIDENT.**—Mr. John Ingram's son Joseph came home on Monday from Wilberforce with a badly gashed thumb. He was working at the jointer in Stevens & Giles's shingle mill, and on Saturday afternoon, in consequence of a shingle slipping, the saw struck his right thumb, missing the first joint and cutting deep into the other two nearly as far down as the wrist. He was driven 25 miles over a rough road to Haliburton, where Dr. Giles dressed the wound, and on Monday morning he took the train to the Falls.

**ACCIDENT.**—On Wednesday of last week Mr. Thomas Graham Sr. of Fenelon met with a painful, but we hope not serious, accident while in his orchard picking up apples blown off the trees by the recent storm. As he was in the act of stooping, a spike on one of the limbs of a cherry tree struck him in the outer corner of his left eye, and penetrated to such a depth that the wound bled very profusely. When we saw him at the Falls on Tuesday he said that he had suffered a good deal for a time, but that the pain had nearly ceased some days ago, and that his son, Dr. Graham, had hopes that the accident would not prove to be very serious.

**POULTRY STEALING.**—Keepers of poultry in the village and its vicinity will do well to put locks upon the doors and stout iron bars up in the windows of their hen-houses, as two or three have lately been visited by nocturnal thieves and some of their feathered occupants stolen. There is a strong suspicion, amounting almost to a certainty, as to the identity of the depredators, but the evidence is purely circumstantial, and might be sworn away by unscrupulous perjurers. The "hen men" of the village ought to club together and buy a couple of mao traps, but we don't suppose that they will do so, and the depredations will probably go on until the perpetrators are caught in the act, or with stolen poultry in their possession.
