THE WOODENWARE FACTORY.—We are pleased to learn that Mr. W. H. Church's effort to establish a woodenware factory at the Falls is likely to be successful. An informal meeting to talk the matter over was held in one of the parlors in the McArthur House on Tuesday evening and over a dozen prominent townsmen, all of whom have subscribed for stock, were present. Messrs. McDougall, Brandon & Austin have a very large and substantial building, close to the railway track, which they put in at \$1,000, a great deal less than its value, and will supply 100 horsepower of electric "energy" at \$15 per h. p. per annum. Other residents of the Falls have already subscribed \$5,000, which will be amply sufficient to commence on, as all the machinery required can be purchased for \$4,000.

VERY LIKE SPRING.—From present appearances (we are writing this on Wednesday afternoon) spring appears to have set in, and that ever welcome visitor, the first robin, may make his appearance in less than a week. The prevailing opinion is that we will have more cold, unpleasant weather, and probably that will prove to be correct; but the advent of spring this early is not unprecedented, though it only occurs at intervals of many years. Mr. John A. Ellis tells us that, when he left for the North-west, about a dozen years ago, on the 1st of April, all his crops were in; and in 1898 robins were here on March 10th, and by the end of the month cattle were beginning to get a bite of grass. This winter, though mild as a whole—the mercury seldom going more than a very few degrees below zero—has been a long and steady one. There was good sleighing on November 25th, nearly a month earlier than usual, and since then the only sign of a thaw was a slight rise in the temperature, accompanied by a little rain, on the 26th of January. It is certainly very like spring just at present; but as it is as difficult to predict what kind of weather we are going to have as it is to tell what verdict a jury will bring in, we decline to express an opinion on the subject. We shall not be surprised if this is spring, nor shall we be in the least degree surprised if it isn't.
