Figures That Should Startle Humanity.

The United States Steel Corporation
has realized a profit of \$111,000,000
during its first year.

This colossal sum, like the five hun-
dred million dollars that the railway
magnates have pocketed during the
past year, has been wrung from the lives
of the workers!

These tremendous figures represent
the toil, the sweat, the brawn, the blood,
the vitality of the men in the mills and
mines, on the farms, and in other in-
dustrial pursuits, paid as tribute to par-
asitical coupon-clippers for the right to
walk upon the earth:

In gazing upon these staggering
sums, one wonders whether the race is
really civilized, or insane, or in slavery!
We are forced to the conclusion that it
is slavery, re-enforced by ignorance and
superstition, that is responsible for this
terrible situation. If men would only
be wise enough to smash their old idols!

Since 1890, according to the United
States census reports, wages have de-
creased 8 per cent!

Since 1897, according to Dun's (the
leading commercial authority in the
United States), prices of necessities
have increased 32 per cent!

Bread and meat are the staple
products of consumption alike by the rural
and urban working class.

Now comes the startling news that
the millers have organized a \$400,000,
000 trust. The promoters deny that
they are going to raise prices, but they
cannot be believed under oath, for the
very good reason that reports come from
a dozen different points that flour is ad-
vancing in price, and on June 11th the
magnates will meet in Chicago and still
further "regulate" affairs.

During the past few months meat has
steadily advanced in price. The Swift-
Armour conspirators claim that cattle
have increased in price, and feed is
higher. They lie! They are dictating
prices to cattle raisers and ranchers this
very moment.

They are trying to ruin the farmers
and confiscate their ranches and herds
through their subsidiary live stock trust,
which is steadily sweeping through the
fertile southwest. This monstrous com-
bine has cleaned up one hundred mil-
lion dollars more than its usual exorbitant
profits during the past few months!

Hundreds of retailers are being driven
out of business in the large cities and
thousands of poor families are unable
to purchase fresh meat. It is a luxury
to them, or entirely out of reach. Yet
the octopus is selling meat cheaper in
European cities than in America. It
is aiming to conquer the world's market.

The working people of America are
expected to starve and suffer to satisfy
the ravenous greed for pelf and power
of a small band of land pirates. These
bread and meat monopolists are sowing
seed that may some day culminate in
fierce riots, bloodshed and destruction.

They are traitors to their country!
and they are doubly dangerous because
they are entrenched behind the laws
and their interests are protected by the
polluted parties in power. Has anyone
heard a word of protest from the jaw-
smith politicians? No! Hanging the
merciless robbers, though it might
soothe an outraged, exploited public
mind temporarily, would not prove a
solution.

The corporation, the trust, the thing
without a soul, conceived in hell and

born in iniquity, would still be there!
other individuals would stand in the
shoes of the departed scoundrels.

The only way to destroy the greed of
the trusts is with votes! Votes gain
the governing power and make it pos-
sible to change laws! The Socialist
party stands for a complete change of

Hot Talk from Australia.

It is because every conclusion of rea-
son and every page of history, every re-
sult of deductive or inductive reason-
ing, points to a sure doom for the na-
tion which is dominated by a plutocracy,
that the outlook for England is at the
present moment so gloomy. She, con-
spicuous among all the nations, is ruled
by the money power. Her cities are
the offices, her fields the playgrounds,
her Cabinets the puppets, of the world's
millionaires—British, German, French,
South African, American millionaires.
Even her memorable churches are
crowded by the world's money-changers.
Millionaire Rhodes buys the policy of
a British Government on the Egyptian
question with a money gift. The same
man of money, with his German con-
jutor, Beit, embarks another Govern-
ment on the South African war. Mil-
lionaires from anywhere and everywhere
dominate London society and London
journalism—such men as the renegade
Astor, Carnegie (whose iron works in
America flowed with the blood of his
laborers), Boss Croker (the Tammany
thief), Rothschild (the financial friend
of the present King). Sometimes Brit-
ish millionaire Hooley figures as the
donor of communion plate to the Estab-
lished English Church; American mil-
lionaire Pierpont Morgan presents to it
an electric-lighting service for its chief
cathedral. Millionaire Lipton rep-
resents the Empire in international sport.
In politics, religion, society, art, sport,
the millionaire is supreme. It is not
necessary for him to be a British mil-
lionaire; any sort of millionaire can
rule in England, devastate her fields
for deer parks, degrade her social rela-
tions, direct her armies and navies to
unjust murders, and desecrate her
churches. The typical English squire
is Boss Croker, the typical English so-
ciety king Astor, the typical English
Cabinet-maker Rhodes, the typical hier-
arch Pierpont Morgan. The foreign
millionaire rules in every department
of British life; to British men is left
only the drudgery of obeying, of fight-
ing and wage-earning for their moneyed
masters.

And it is on this gold-cankered na-
tion that Australia is asked to pattern
her life, to model her politics, to fashion
her national ideals. She cannot do it
and live.—Bulletin (Sydney).
