As many as the hall will hold should hear him, especially all who have not decided how they will vote, as he will adduce facts and figures calculated to convince them that, in the interests of the province, they ought to do their very best to secure the election of Mr. Heys.

Which Will It Be?

The Provincial elections are to take place on Thursday, the 29th inst.—the nominations a week earlier, on the 22nd. In this riding there are two candidates, Mr. J. H. Carnegie, who has represented it for eight years, and Mr. L. F. Heyd, K. C., of Toronto, who was nominated at the Liberal convention held here on February 12th, and the question to be decided is, which of these two gentlemen is to be M. P. for East Victoria after three weeks from next Thursday. If the reports we hear from all parts of the riding regarding public opinion are true—and we have no reason to doubt them—Mr. Heyd will be the man. There is nothing "agin" Mr. Carnegie except his politics; every Liberal is ready to admit that he is a "nice man" and a "perfect gentleman;" but he is opposed to the Ross Government, which a great majority of the people of the province approve of, and which Mr. Heyd will support. The *Globe* says, and says truly:

"The policy of the Government has been conspicuously successful not only in saving and conserving our inherited wealth, but also in its progressive development. In the older and settled parts of the Province trade and industry have been stimulated by the best possible methods. As soon as the time became ripe for the development of new Ontario the Ross Ministry rose to the occasion, and we have not only the establishment of gigantic industries, but a growing source of public revenue. The way the Liberal Ministers resisted all demands for the disposal of this public heritage in the hope of premature development proves them worthy to be classed as able and far-seeing statesmen. This territory, destined to be a source of wealth for years, would have been surrendered by the Conservative leaders of Ontario to please their party allies at Ottawa. This magnifying of the party contest—this elevating of it to the dignity of an end in itself rather than a means of improvement—seems a besetting weakness of Mr. Whitney and his followers. The electors realize more fully than the active Conservative politicians the importance of a sound and stable Provincial administration. Did

they magnify party interests, as Mr. Whitney and his immediate followers do, the Province would have met financial disaster long ago."

The defeat of the Government is not expected, however much it may be hoped for, by any well-informed Conservative; and it is foolish for a constituency, especially such a one as East Victoria, to persist in sending to the Legislature a representative to sit in the "cold shades of Opposition," when nothing can be gained and something may be lost by so doing. Of course everybody will admit that a constituency should receive such grants as it is justly entitled to, without regard to the politics of its representative; but it seldom does. At the Liberal convention either Mr. Stratton or Mr. Heyd—we forget which—said that even if a Government were disposed to treat friends and enemies alike it could not always follow its inclinations, because some of its supporters would say: "Look here! if you do as much for those fellows in (for instance) East Victoria, who always send an opponent, as you do for us, we'll go back on you." With regard to the abilities of our two candidates, and their fitness to represent us, we do not think there can be any difference of opinion. We do not wish to disparage Mr. Carnegie, who is fully as able a man as many who are elected to Parliament; but he is not as well posted on public questions, nor anything like as fluent or forcible a speaker, as Mr. Heyd, who makes a most favorable impression upon every audience he addresses. Of course, the fact that he is a "Toronto lawyer" is harped upon by his opponents, who did not on that ground object to being represented at Ottawa for many years by the late Hector Cameron; and the electors can easily understand that it will be a distinct advantage to have a representative who resides within a few rods of the Parliament buildings, instead of not much less than a hundred miles away. If the people of East Victoria, especially in the far-off parts of the riding, know what is good for them, and they probably do, they will give Mr. Heyd a good majority at the coming election. We are glad to hear that in West Victoria Mr. Newton Smale's return is looked upon as almost certain.

A "Pointer" for Prohibitionists.

Rev. D. Spencer, of Brantford, a prominent prohibitionist—as many clergymen are and all of them should be—has written a letter to the *Brantford Expositor*, in which he says:

"We have two parties in our Legislative Assembly. From the Conservative party we cannot and do not expect any temperance legislation. Mr. Whitney has stated his position frankly and fully, and we give him credit and thanks for placing himself where we know where to find him. The majority, the vast majority, of his followers are with him in those deliverances, so that there can be no question that from the Tory party will come no legislation of a prohibitory character. Every elector should note this fact carefully and remember that the pledge of the Conservative party is against the liquor act, against the referendum, and against all the curtailment of liquor interest as practised by the Ross Government up to date."
